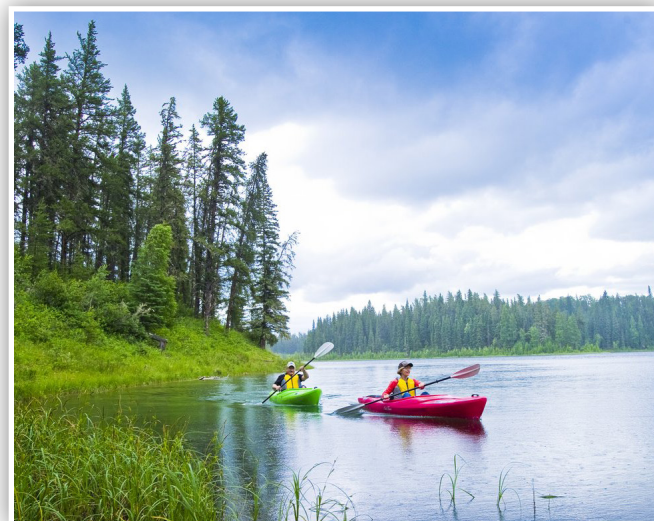

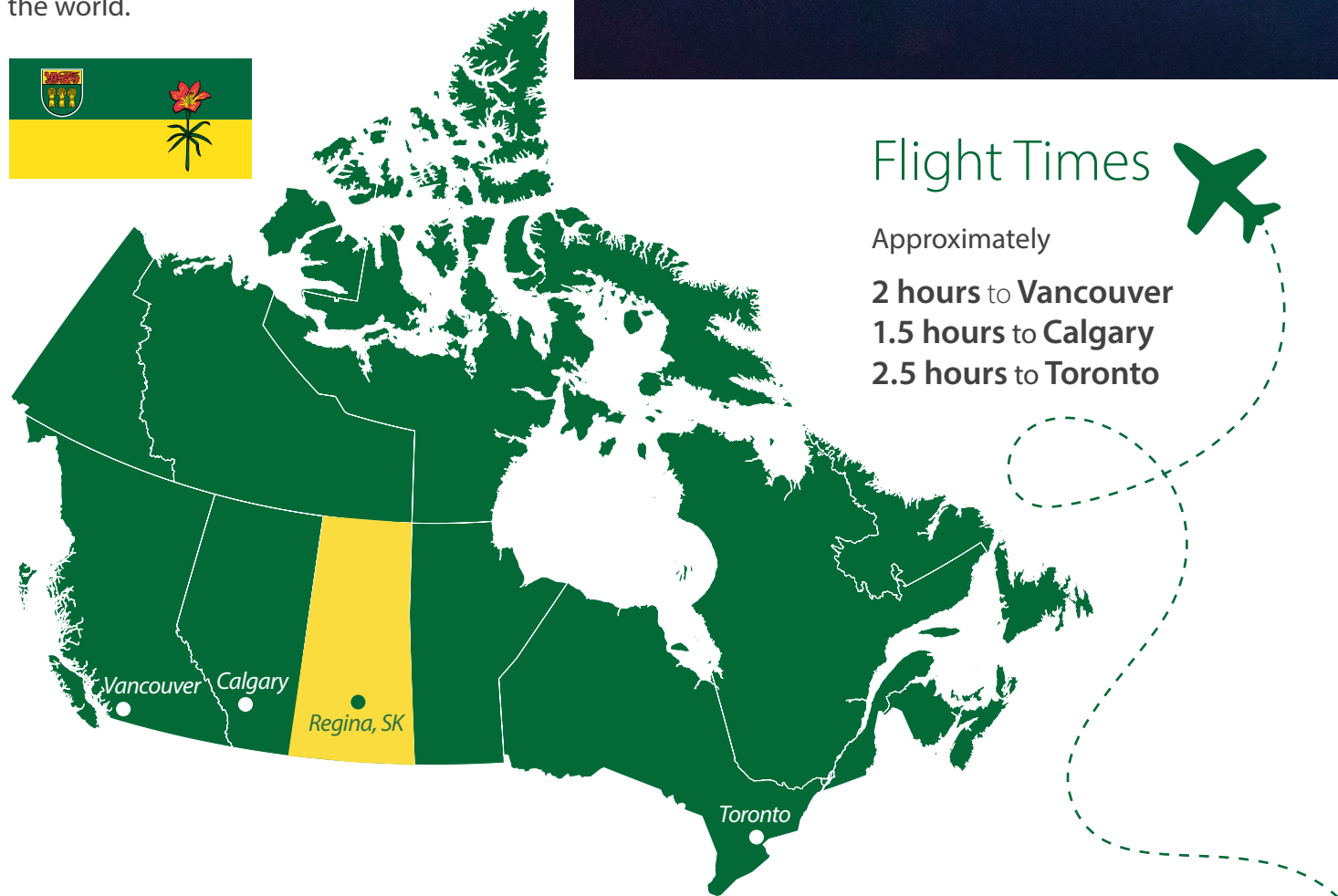
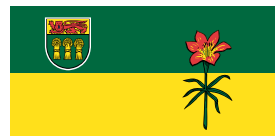

Saskatchewan has Four Seasons

You'll find year-round activities in Saskatchewan. The many lakes in the province are perfect for canoeing, boating, swimming and ice-fishing. In the winter, there are many winter recreational opportunities, including hills and slopes for skiing, snowboarding and tobogganing. Provincial parks in many areas allow camping and picnics. Many communities have parks, play areas and outdoor wading pools for children.

The province is also home to numerous cultural events including winter festivals, symphony concerts and historical celebrations.

Spring April – June



As the days and nights get warmer, yards turn green, gardens flourish, flowers bloom and farm fields burst into colour.

Summer July – August



Hot, sunny days and warm nights. Parks, beaches and backyards are full. Families go to the many summer fairs and festivals, or just get in the car and explore the countryside.

Autumn September – October



Warm, sunny days that give way to cool, crisp nights with huge harvest moons. City and countryside erupt in a glorious display of colour.

Winter November – March



Days are generally sunny, the snow dry and powdery – perfect for skiing, tobogganing, skating, snowmobiling, ice fishing, winter festivals or hockey games. Our coldest days are often our most beautiful days, with sun dogs blazing in the sky. Often on winter nights the dancing Northern Lights appear.

Key Economic Sectors

Agriculture and Agri-Value

Saskatchewan is recognized worldwide for the quality of its crops, and is the world's largest exporter of dry peas, lentils, durum wheat, mustard seed, canola, flaxseed and oats. The province is also the second largest cattle-producing province in Canada and home to 40% of the country's crop land.

Energy

Saskatchewan is an energy giant, with the most diverse primary energy resource base in Canada. The province is one of the only jurisdictions in the world that produces crude oil, natural gas, coal, uranium, biofuels, geothermal, wind and hydro power.

Oil and Gas

Saskatchewan is the second-largest oil producer and the third-largest producer of natural gas in Canada.

Forestry

Saskatchewan's Commercial Forest Zone comprises 11.7 million hectares, of which 5.3 million hectares are classified as productive forest land available for commercial timber harvesting.

Life Sciences and Biomass

Saskatchewan is recognized as a world leader in biotechnology and life sciences, with some of the most advanced facilities in Canada.

Manufacturing

Saskatchewan manufacturers have achieved many world firsts – in everything from satellite communications technology and dryland farming equipment to in-road scales for the trucking industry.

Mining

Saskatchewan is a world-leader in potash and uranium with unrealized potential in diamonds, base metals and precious metals.

Technology

Saskatchewan has the solid research and development infrastructure and local talent to support a thriving technology sector. The sector is especially strong in agtech, enterprise software and satellite communications. For more information, visit investSK.ca.





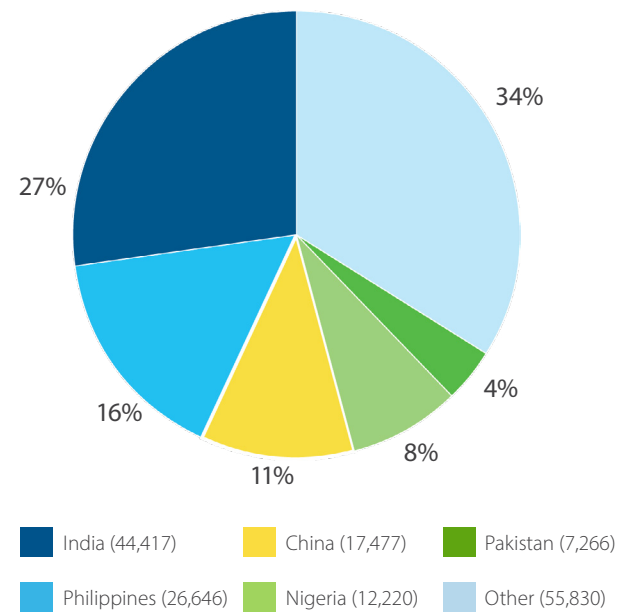
Cities and Communities

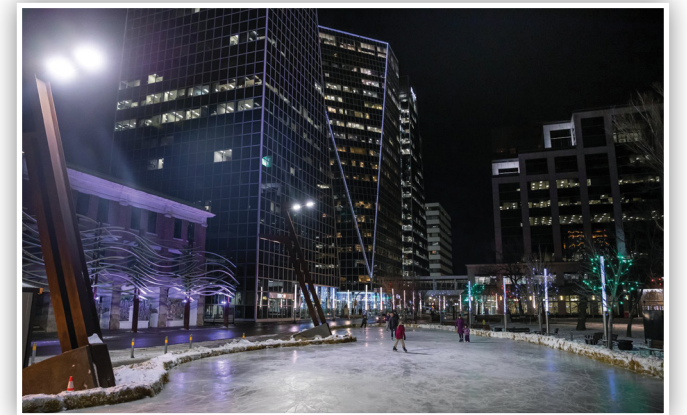
Regina

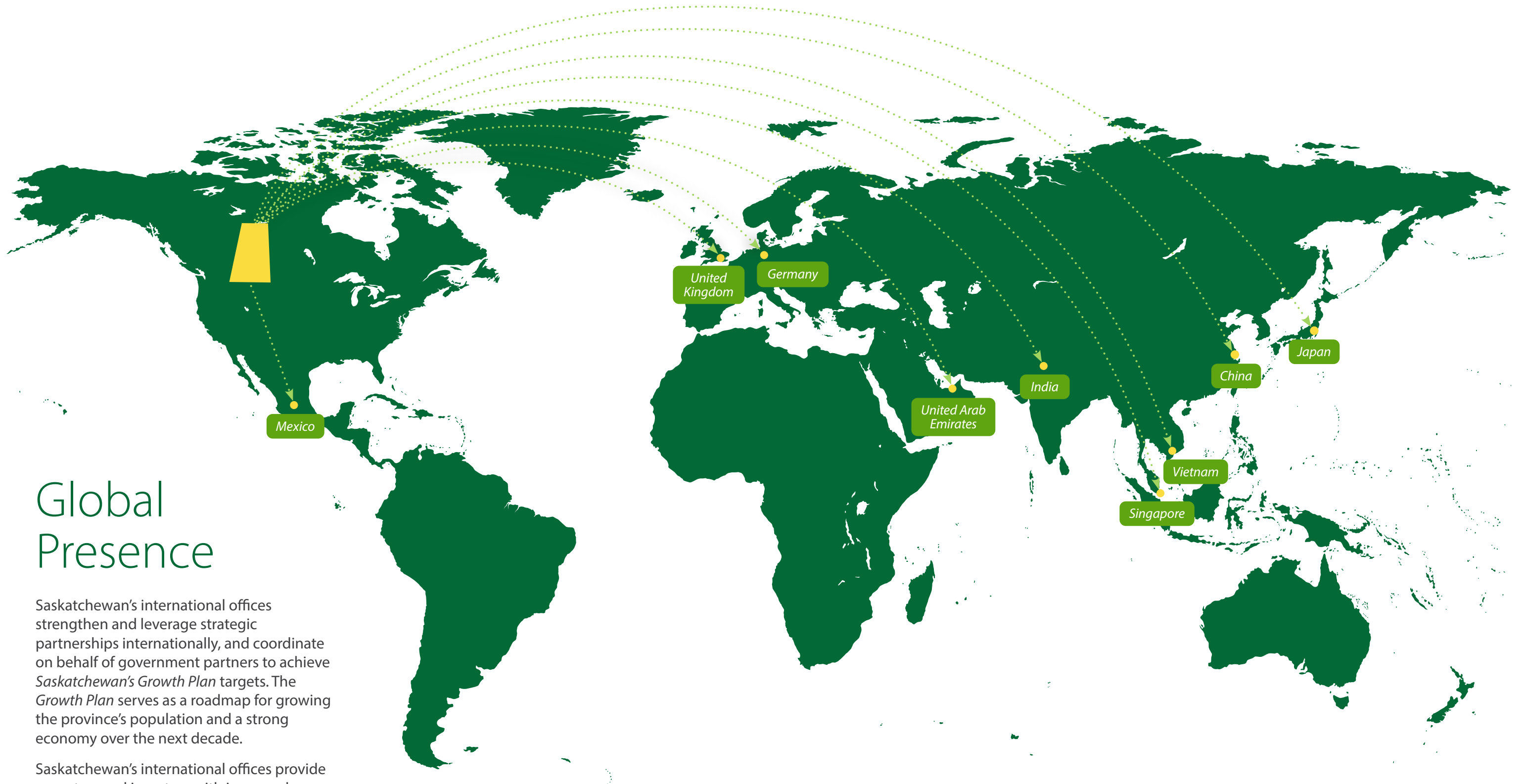

The province's [International Education Strategy](#) lays the foundation for a global approach to position Saskatchewan as a destination of choice for international students from around the world; and provides opportunities for Saskatchewan students to study in other countries.



Key components of the strategy include:

- Fostering new international partnerships to promote education and research opportunities in both Saskatchewan and abroad.
- Supporting global citizenship in Saskatchewan and abroad through the Saskatchewan Ambassador Program.
- Developing a new International Education Practitioner Program to support a provincial approach on training throughout the sector that will provide students with a consistent experience, regardless of an urban or rural community.
- Supporting the growth and sustainability of French post-secondary programs in Saskatchewan through targeted recruitment in key French language markets.
- Participating in international missions to support branding efforts.

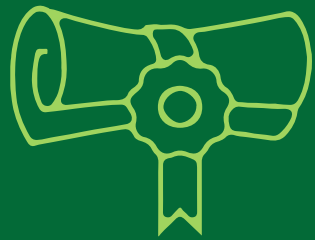




University



Regional College

University of Saskatchewan

The University of Saskatchewan (USask) is one of the top research-intensive, medical doctoral universities in Canada, and is home to world-leading research in areas of global importance, such as water and food security, infectious diseases, agriculture, information technology, health services and biotechnology.

USask's main campus is located in the vibrant city of Saskatoon on Treaty 6 territory and the traditional home of the Métis. This historic campus is recognized as one of the country's most beautiful, with plenty of green space, stately greystone buildings and tree-lined walkways.

USask's diverse range of programs include degrees in agriculture, arts, business, education, engineering, kinesiology, law and science, as well as a full range of health sciences including dentistry, medicine, nursing, nutrition, pharmacy and veterinary medicine.

USask also offers online and in-person English language study programs, including a joint admission pathway for students intending to enroll in direct-entry undergraduate degrees, and short-term and specialized programs for individuals and groups.

Global Partnerships

USask continues to engage in partnerships with institutions and organizations from around the world with a focus on developing customized, short-term group programs that are based on academic and cultural areas of interest.

As of April 30, 2025, USask is engaged in over **250** active agreements with more than **200** partners in **60 countries** around the world, including the globally top ranked institutions such as Korea University, Ludwig-Maximilians- Universität München, Peking University, Sungkyunkwan University, University of Birmingham and Yonsei University.

Research

As one of Canada's 15 leading research-intensive universities, USask provides a highly collaborative research environment with some of the best facilities and analytical tools in the country.



The **Canadian Light Source** is Canada's only synchrotron and one of the most advanced in the world. It allows scientists to see the microscopic nature of matter. Over 4,000 scientists from 41 countries have used it to publish 6,000 scientific papers in 874 international scientific collaborations.



The **Vaccine and Infectious Disease Organization (VIDO)**, a leading international vaccine research centre, responsible for developing vaccines to protect people and animals from global diseases, such as avian influenza and COVID-19.



The **Global Institute for Food Security (GIFS)** works with multiple partners to discover, develop and deliver innovative solutions for the production of globally sustainable food.



The **Saskatchewan Food Industry Development Centre** assists local and international agri-businesses in creating innovative products and value-added opportunities in the food industry.



The **Global Institute for Water Security** is leading the largest university-led international fresh water research program with more than 170 partners world-wide.



The **Crop Development Centre** is a field crop research organization where scientists integrate basic research with genetic improvement of a variety of crops such as spring wheat, barley, chickpea, and more.



The **Livestock Forage Centre of Excellence** is a world-class complex of field and science laboratories which strives to improve livestock production around the globe.



The **Integrated Health Sciences Complex** fosters collaboration between students, faculty, and researchers across health disciplines.



Prairie Diagnostic Services Inc. provides veterinary diagnostic services and expertise in support of animal health diagnostics, research, teaching and surveillance.



University of Regina

The University of Regina (U of R) prides itself in being an inclusive campus and welcomes students from around the world, supporting them in a variety of ways. The university has campuses located in Regina and Saskatoon on Treaty 4 and Treaty 6 territories. Its main campus is in the City of Regina located in beautiful Wascana Park, one of the largest urban parks in North America. Students can walk, run, paddleboard, snowshoe and bike around the park.

The City of Regina is rich with cultural heritage. The city is also home to the world famous Royal Canadian Mounted Police as well as one-of-a-kind attractions like the Royal Saskatchewan Museum, Saskatchewan Science Centre, MacKenzie Art Gallery, and Darke Hall theatre.

The university offers degree programming in areas such as engineering, business administration, science, education and social work, as well as a number of health-related fields including nursing and kinesiology and health studies.

Students have access to on-campus and online academic supports as well as amenities, including on-campus housing, a student-run art gallery, libraries, coffee shops, a pool, and a state-of-the-art fitness and athletics facility. Located in each of the province's four largest cities (Saskatoon, Regina, Prince Albert and Moose Jaw) Saskatchewan Polytechnic is the province's leading publicly funded post-secondary technical and skills training institute.

More than **50 post-secondary programs** are offered to international students which lead to rewarding careers in business, information technology, health, mining, transportation and other sectors.

Approximately two-thirds of Saskatchewan Polytechnic programs offer a work-integrated learning component to gain real-world experience. Depending on the program, students will reinforce their skills through labs, clinical placements, field investigations, outdoor camps, machinery time, workplace practicums and/or co-op work terms.

Study in French

The French language is one of Canada's two official languages, making the fluency in the language an asset in entering Canada and Saskatchewan's workforce. A French post-secondary certificate, diploma or degree can open many doors in Canada, as well as internationally, at a personal and professional level. This diploma can also serve as a starting point towards multiple careers or fields of study such as education, nursing, law, international studies and journalism.

La Cité offers an ideal setting for a bilingual university experience—students can learn in a favorable immersion environment while familiarizing themselves with the Fransaskois community.

The **Faculty of Education** at the University of Regina offers French teaching degrees such as the **Baccalauréat en éducation française** and the **Maîtrise en éducation française** to prepare its graduates to successfully teach at English language schools, French immersion schools or Fransaskois schools.

Collège Mathieu has three campuses located in Gravelbourg, Regina and Saskatoon, and offers professional and technical training in the fields of administration, education, trades, health and tourism. It is the only technical and vocational college in French in Saskatchewan since 1918. Students can study a wide variety of programs in French, including business administration, early childhood education, journalism, occupational therapist assistant, health care attendant and more.

Saskatchewan has a rich and enduring connection with the French language dating back over 250 years. Language, culture and diversity have combined to form relationships and create a province wide francophone collective known as the Fransaskois community, a vibrant, thriving component of the social fabric within the province of Saskatchewan.

Education in Saskatchewan

Saskatchewan ensures that our province has a highly skilled and educated population by putting the needs of students first. Our education system is based on the principle that all students, regardless of race, gender, and ability have equal rights and opportunities.

Saskatchewan’s education system has the following components:

Education	Grades /Certification	Age*
Elementary	Prekindergarten to Grade 9	3 or 4 – 14 or 15
Secondary	Grades 10 – 12**	15 – 17 or 18 or up to age 22
Post-Secondary	Certificate, Diploma, Degree	17 or 18 +

*Reflects age of child at the beginning of Saskatchewan’s school year in September. School years typically run from September to June.

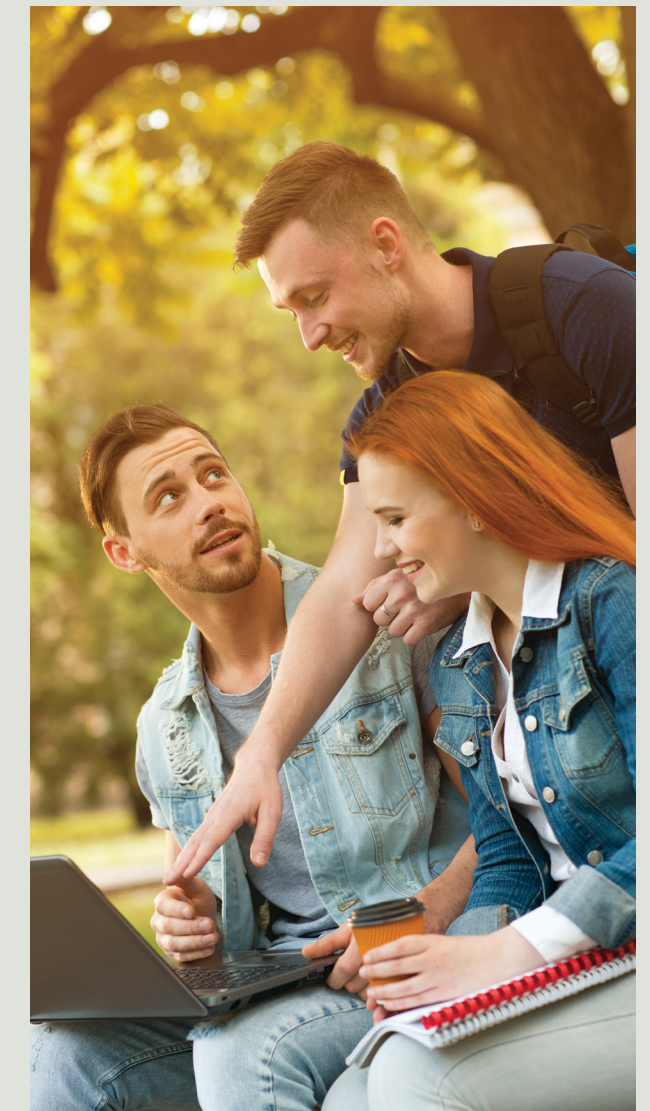
**Secondary grades are 10-12 where credits are granted.

Elementary and Secondary Education

In Saskatchewan, school divisions oversee a group of schools, based on their location. It is the parents’ choice as to the type of school in which they wish to enroll their child(ren). All schools in Saskatchewan use Saskatchewan provincial curricula which are developed by the Government of Saskatchewan.

There are 27 school divisions in Saskatchewan which include 18 public school divisions, eight separate school divisions, which are Roman Catholic, and one Francophone school division which provides education to students whose first language is French. Saskatchewan also has a variety of other types of schools including Historical High Schools with residences, Associate Independent Schools, Qualified Independent Schools and Certified Independent Schools.

Post-Secondary Education

Saskatchewan post-secondary education is offered through post-secondary institutions that provide certificates, diploma, or degree credentials.

Post-secondary institutions in Saskatchewan must be designated by the province to enroll international students. See page 16 for more information on post-secondary institutions in Saskatchewan, or visit saskatchewan.ca for a list of designated institutions.

Cost of Studying in Saskatchewan and Scholarships

In Saskatchewan, elementary and secondary school divisions determine their own tuition fee amount for non-residents based on the per-student cost of educating the student within that division. As a result, each school division charges a unique per-student tuition fee amount. Tuition for elementary and secondary students may be waived if their parents are residing in Saskatchewan on a work permit or are completing a full-time degree or diploma program in Saskatchewan. You may contact your chosen school division for more information. Historical High Schools, Associate Schools, Qualified Independent Schools and Certified Independent Schools set their own tuition rates.

Why study English as a Second Language Program (ESL) in Saskatchewan:

- Experience the academic culture on campus before you enter your degree program.
- Develop lifelong friendships in your intensive language classes.
- Live with a Canadian family and experience Canadian culture while improving your English.



Graduate Retention Program

The [Graduate Retention Program](#) provides income tax credits of up to **\$24,000** of tuition fees paid by eligible graduates (including international graduates) who live in Saskatchewan and who file a Saskatchewan income tax return.



Language of Instruction in Saskatchewan Schools

In Saskatchewan, the languages of instruction are either English or French. Each school in Saskatchewan is responsible for supporting newcomer students in learning English as an Additional Language (EAL). In Francophone schools, newcomer students are provided support in learning French (Francisation) and EAL.

In the post-secondary system, both the University of Regina and the University of Saskatchewan are accredited as language schools by Languages Canada. English language programs can be taken before or as part of your studies.

Work in Saskatchewan

Saskatchewan's vibrant economy and growing population have contributed to competitive wages and strong job prospects in the province. Saskatchewan's key sectors include agriculture, construction, energy, forestry, manufacturing, mining, life science and biotechnology, and information technology.

Saskatchewan has competitive wages and strong job prospects in the province. The province's unemployment rate is among the lowest in the country, with averages just between 4% and 6% since the 1970s. The average family income in the province is more than \$90,000 per year.

Work While you Study

It is possible to work in Saskatchewan while you are a student. Some institutions may offer co-op/internship opportunities for students depending on their program of study.

With the changes to the International Student Program, full-time international students enrolled at designated post-secondary educational institutions may work part-time off campus and full-time during scheduled school breaks without a work permit. However, if you wish to work as part of a co-op/internship program, you will need to apply for a co-op work permit.

Work After you Graduate

The Post-Graduation Work Permit Program provides eligible international graduating students with an opportunity to work in Canada for up to three years. Visit the Stay in Canada after Graduation page at [canada.ca](#) for more information.

Become a Permanent Resident

Following your studies, we hope you will decide to stay in Saskatchewan. Through the Saskatchewan Immigrant Nominee Program (SINP), the province invites residency applications from non-Canadians who want to make Saskatchewan their home. Successful applicants will be nominated to the federal government, so they can gain permanent residency in Canada.

You may consider applying for permanent residency through the Saskatchewan Immigrant Nominee Program or the Canadian Express Entry. Before you apply, make sure you know the requirements and current application procedures as the policies are subject to change. 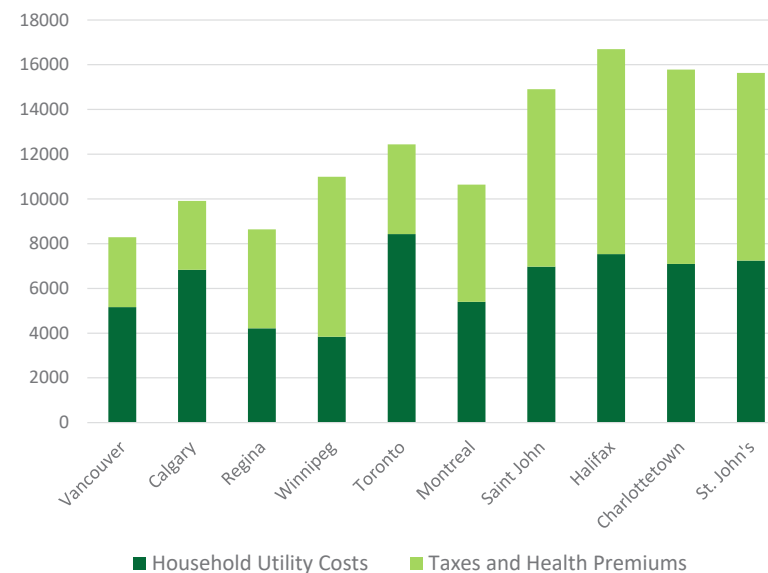


Cost of Living

Housing costs in Saskatchewan's cities and communities are lower than most major Canadian cities. The costs of transportation are also low. If you choose to live off-campus, you can take advantage of the reasonably priced, unlimited transit pass included in your student fees.

In 2021, a two-income family with an annual income of \$75,000 will pay lower combined taxes and household utility costs in our capital city of Regina than in most other major Canadian cities. Saskatchewan is also home to some of the lowest utility rates in Canada.

Health Care

International students in Saskatchewan are eligible to apply for a Saskatchewan Health Card. A valid Saskatchewan health card provides international students access to basic medical care services in the province free of charge. These include:

- Appointments with a family doctor or specialist physician
- Walk-in clinic health care
- Emergency room treatment
- Hospital treatment based on doctors' recommendation
- Maternity care

To apply for a Saskatchewan health card, an international student will need a valid study permit, proof of registered, full-time status and a Saskatchewan residence address.

Some post-secondary institutions, including the University of Regina, the University of Saskatchewan and Saskatchewan Polytechnic offer extended health and dental coverage for international students.

Saskatchewan has a number of services to help newcomers to Canada settle into the province. From welcome centres across the province to translation services, we have services available to help you make our province your new home.

In addition to safe and friendly communities, you will enjoy the natural beauty of prairie grassland, rolling parkland, lush boreal forest and nearly 100,000 lakes.

Saskatchewan has 19 national parks and historic sites, 39 provincial parks and historic parks and 75 accredited regional parks.

Saskatchewan offers a variety of entertainment options. No matter where you choose to live, you will find activities to suit your personal interests. Museums, art galleries, entertainment venues, local shops and malls, and acclaimed restaurants animate cities and communities. Diverse events are held throughout the year.

The province is home to the popular Saskatchewan Roughriders, a Canadian Football League team. Modern multi-sport facilities for hockey, swimming, soccer (football) and a variety of sports are located in Saskatchewan cities.

Along with the change in seasons comes a change in scenery and an opportunity to try new activities. From spring to fall, you may find yourself hiking, cycling, attending events and festivals, and visiting the parks and beaches. In winter, the temperatures dip; however, days are generally sunny and the snow is light and powdery – perfect for skiing, tobogganing and snowshoeing.
