

Irrigation Legislation Guide for Producers



2025

A. Introduction

Saskatchewan's climate makes it appealing for irrigation development, as moisture is the main limitation to agriculture in most areas of the province. Those areas with semi-arid climates are restricted in the types of crops that can be grown and the number of livestock that can be supported per unit of land. Irrigation has been used as a tool to diversify the rural economy and to stabilize crop production.

Developing an irrigation project can be complex, as several ministries and agencies are involved. To assist you, the [full process is available on our website](#). This document outlines the legislative requirements to be considered and complied with when developing an irrigation project.

Compliance with the legislated requirements is important to you, the community and the sector. The legislated requirements will ensure your infrastructure investment is expended with a clear understanding that your project has met the requirements to proceed.

- Failure to meet legislated requirements may result in penalties and/or disruption of water services.
- Program funding and potential financing may be impacted if your project does not meet all the necessary legislative requirements.

This document has been prepared to support the agricultural producer's journey to regulatory compliance. Effective planning will support robust financial management and provide confidence that all regulatory requirements are met, reducing regulatory and construction risk to the producer in the long term.

What you need to know:

- All required approvals must be obtained prior to the initiation of the construction activities for the project.
- Thoughtful consideration should be given to future expansion requirements to ensure sufficient room for expansion. Given the complexity of the requirements for some projects, it is recommended that producers consider incorporating project management using a consultant who is familiar with the various regulatory requirements to reduce the overall time from project conception to first watering.
- Agricultural producers are responsible for completing each step of the process when managing their project.
- The various agencies and ministries will provide technical support to help meet legislative requirements.
- The term "completed application" will be used consistently throughout the document. A completed application may be different based on the ministry or agency involved. Any changes to the project (routing, construction methodology, land etc.) from the completed application may result in project and approval delays.
- Construction without the proper approvals may put the project at risk due to civil disputes that could occur if all legislative requirements are not met. The legislative requirements protect you, your investment and the public trust of the irrigation industry.

Please note not all items on the checklist or contained within the document may be required for your project. Each irrigation development is unique. As such, the Irrigation Unit, Ministry of Agriculture, in partnership with many other ministries and agencies, can assist you in determining the specific needs for your project.

D. Non-District Irrigator
