



2026 Saskatchewan Resident Big Game Draw Supplement

The 2026 Big Game Draw Supplement provides Saskatchewan resident hunters with information on the seasons and quotas for draw species, as well as advance notice of changes to this fall's Big Game Draw seasons.

Most qualified applicants for the 2025 Legacy pool were successfully drawn and the number of hunters moving from the Super A pool to Legacy pool remains low. The chances of eligible applicants being drawn in the Legacy pool are very good.

Please be aware of your pool status when completing your draw application and plan appropriately.

You are not required to apply to progress through the D, C and B pools – you will automatically advance. Once in A pool, you must apply to advance to Super A pool and apply each year after to retain it. If you miss applying, you will go back to A pool and remain there until you apply again.

If you do not wish to hunt but want to keep your pool status, apply for zone 99.

Reminder - The 2026 Big Game Draw application period opens May 1 and closes on the last Thursday of May (May 28) at 4 p.m. Carefully review your application and submit it prior to the deadline. Changes to the application cannot be made after the deadline.

Licence information

All awarded Big Game Draw licences will be available to purchase through your HAL account beginning Aug. 1, 2026.

Licences will not be mailed to successful applicants.

If you are selected for a draw licence, you will not be allowed to purchase a regular licence for the same species.

Hunter Harvest Survey

Beginning this fall, hunters who fail to submit their required Hunter Harvest Survey will be charged a \$15 fee when purchasing their next hunting licence in the following year. Hunters are asked to complete the survey following the hunting season as data collected from these surveys are an important tool for wildlife biologists to assess game population trends and adjust hunting quotas.

Chronic Wasting Disease

Chronic wasting disease is established in Saskatchewan and poses a risk to populations of wild deer, elk, moose, and caribou. A better understanding of CWD prevalence across the province allows wildlife managers to more accurately assess impacts on survival and ensure that harvest is not over-allocated in the face of disease. In 2026-27, the ministry is implementing mandatory CWD testing for elk and deer harvested on draw and regular licences in WMZ 43, 47, 49 and 53. In WMZ 50 and 55, mandatory CWD testing will apply to elk harvested on draw and regular licences. In addition, outfitters will be required to submit CWD samples from white-tailed deer harvested in WMZ 49, 50, 53, and 55-69. Surveillance is shifting to a rolling-coverage approach, with a current focus on the Boreal Fringe and Southern Boreal regions and a move to the Parkland region once sample size targets are met. Hunters can visit cwdsk.ca to learn how to submit animals for testing. Moose Opportunities

Wildlife managers remain concerned about declining moose populations in the forest highlighting the need to manage hunting opportunities accordingly. This decline is consistent across western Canada with increased access, predation, overharvest, and health-related factors leading to lower moose abundance. In response to these declines restrictive draw-only bull moose seasons will remain in WMZ's 55-69. Regular bull moose seasons in WMZs 70-76 are unchanged with access and harvest being monitored.

Moose seasons in the non-forest (WMZs 1-54) remain unchanged to allow adequate monitoring of the response to the 2021 season and quota reductions.

Mule Deer Opportunities

Mule deer populations have declined across much of the province due to recent severe winter and drought conditions. As a result, further adjustments to mule deer hunting opportunities are being made to bring harvest into alignment with population objectives.

After a near province-wide closure of the antlerless mule deer season in the 2025/26 season, the first antlerless mule deer quota is being reduced to zero across the remainder of the province, in WMZ's 31-39 and urban management zones SWMZ and RWMZ. This will help further protect the

reproductive cohort and support population growth back to management objectives.

The draw either-sex mule deer quota will remain in place in urban zones SWMZ and RWMZ, where the management objective is population stability rather than growth.

The regular archery mule deer licence will also become buck-only in WMZs 31-39, remaining as an either-sex harvest opportunity only in SWMZ and RWMZ where an either-sex draw quota remains in place. The South Saskatchewan River Valley (WMZs 8-14E & 14W), where CWD rates are highest and where CWD, drought, and winter have had the most substantial impacts on populations, will remain closed to mule deer hunting.

Elk Opportunities

Elk hunting opportunities remain available throughout much of the province. Elk draw quotas mostly remain unchanged from 2025, with the following updates for 2026. The antlerless elk draw in combined WMZs 8 and 11 (Designate WMZ 8A) is removed.

In WMZs 37 and 39, adjustments are being made to address ongoing agricultural conflicts and elk distribution. In both zones, the early antlerless season is extended to October 1–November 30. In WMZ 37, the antlerless elk quota increases to 625 (Designate WMZ 37A) and the either-sex quota increases to 175 (Designate WMZ 37). In WMZ 39, the antlerless elk quota increases to 625 (Designate WMZ 39A) and the either-sex quota increases to 175 (Designate WMZ 39).

Regular season changes include an either-sex season in WMZs 48, 56, and 57, with an antlerless draw quota of 300 (Designate WMZ 48A).

2026 Saskatchewan Resident Big Game Draw checklist

Use this checklist to avoid common mistakes and ensure your application is submitted successfully. Improperly submitted applications may be rejected from the draw or have an undesirable result. Avoid disappointment and take time to read the information carefully.

Detailed instructions are available at saskatchewanhal.ca to ensure a trouble-free application process.

Apply early and review your applications for accuracy prior to the deadline. You can review and edit your applications in your HAL account at any time, as well as check your draw status.

Make sure you are eligible to apply

- At the time of application, all listed hunters must meet residency and age requirements, comply with firearm safety/hunter education regulations and not be suspended from hunting in Saskatchewan. It is unlawful to apply for a licence without firearm safety/hunter education training. If anyone on your application is found to be ineligible, the application will be rejected from the draw.
- Each person may submit only one application for each species type. If a person submits more than one application for the same species type, each application will be rejected from the draw. The exception is mule deer, as either-sex mule deer and antlerless mule deer are considered separate species types for the Big Game Draw and hunters may submit one application for each species type.
- Any applications containing false information will be rejected from the draw. Providing false information is an offence under *The Wildlife Regulations*.

Obtain group member information

- If applying as a group, the HAL number and date of birth for each group member must be included in the application.
- Group members with valid email addresses on their HAL accounts will receive notification emails.

Confirm your pool status

- Make sure you know the pool status of each group member on your

application. Your application will be placed into the priority pool of the group member with the lowest pool status.

- You can view your pool status through your HAL account by visiting the My Account section. If there are any issues with your pool status, contact the ministry's Inquiry Centre at 1-800-567-4224 or centre.inquiry@gov.sk.ca.

Complete your application

- Review the application guide at saskatchewanhal.ca for detailed instructions on how to submit.
- **You may submit your applications anytime between May 1 and the last Thursday of May (May 28) at 4 p.m. Apply early to resolve any problems you may encounter.**
- Select your hunt choices carefully. You may select up to six choices in order of preference. The system will consider your choices in the order listed on the application.
- All applications are reviewed for eligibility and pool status before the Big Game Draw. If there are any issues with your application, contact the ministry's Inquiry Centre at 1-800-567-4224 or centre.inquiry@gov.sk.ca.

Review your application(s) before the deadline

- It's a good idea to review your application prior to the deadline to confirm that all information is correct.
- Big Game Draw applications can be changed at any time before the application period closes. Only the individual who submitted the application can change zone choices and/or group members. These changes can be made on the group leader's HAL account.
- Other members of the group can view, not edit, the application.
- Once the draw period closes, no further applications will be accepted and changes cannot be made to submitted applications.

Confirm your draw results

- Draw results will be available in June. Pronghorn draw results will be available in July.
- Once the draw is completed, your application results will be available through your HAL account.
- You are responsible for checking your draw results.
- Notification emails will be sent with your draw results, but successful email delivery cannot be guaranteed. Do not assume you are not drawn if you do not receive an email notification.

Purchasing your licence

- If drawn, you may purchase your licence through your HAL account beginning Aug. 1.
- Successful applicants will move to the D pool the following year, regardless of whether you purchase the draw licence you are awarded. Applicants are not eligible to purchase a regular licence for the same species.

Declining a Big Game Draw licence

- Hunters who were successfully drawn for:
 - ~ three Big Game Draw licences may decline one draw licence of their choice;
 - ~ four Big Game Draw licences may decline one or two draw licences of their choice; or
 - ~ five Big Game Draw licences may decline up to three draw licences of their choice.
- Eligible applicants who decline a licence will have their pool status reinstated for that species. Declined licences will not be reallocated.
- You must send an email to the Ministry of Environment at centre.inquiry@gov.sk.ca by July 31 to provide written notice of your intention to decline your draw licence.

Attention hunters and anglers

Starting in the 2026-27 season, a new Fisheries Habitat Certificate has been introduced. Individuals who purchase both a hunting and angling licence will only require one Habitat Certificate.

Any application containing ineligible hunters or false information will be rejected from the draw and investigated. Providing false information is an offence, which can result in fines and loss of hunting rights.

Hunter harvest surveys are mandatory

Hunter harvest surveys are important for managing game in Saskatchewan. They provide valuable information for quota and season setting for the upcoming year. Visit saskatchewanhal.ca for more information, including completion deadlines.

Draw seasons

Hunting is allowed in wildlife management units (WMU) and national wildlife areas within a wildlife management zone (WMZ) open for big game. The exception is Fort à La Corne WMU and the St. Denis National Wildlife Research Area. Only the provincial parks and recreation sites listed below are open to hunting. Proposed new season dates, open wildlife management zones or open zone combinations are indicated in **bold and red**.
