Introduction

In 2025, Saskatchewan’s (SK’s) economy expanded, reflecting resilience despite a challenging external environment. Real Gross Domestic Product (GDP) rose by 2.2 per cent to \$85.4 billion (chained 2017 dollars), placing the province fifth nationally and marking the fourth consecutive year of positive growth.

Growth was driven by strong performance in agriculture and construction. The agriculture, forestry, fishing, and hunting sector grew by 15.2 per cent, supported by favourable growing conditions and strong crop yields. Construction increased by 9.3 per cent, reflecting record residential and institutional investment. Health care and social assistance rose by 4.8 per cent. Overall, goods-producing industries expanded 2.9 per cent, while service-producing industries grew 1.7 per cent.

External pressures slowed growth. United States (U.S.) trade tariffs and reduced demand for some of SK exports compounded pre-existing challenges faced by the manufacturing industry, resulting in a 6.2 per cent decline in manufacturing GDP, particularly in the chemical and machinery industries. Lower oil and uranium production also resulted in a 2.1 per cent contraction in the extractive sector.

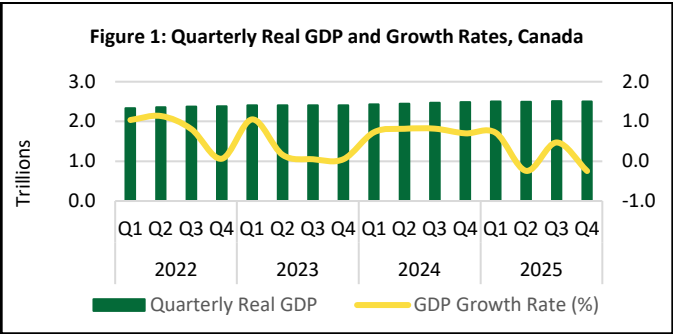
Canadian Economic Growth

According to the International Monetary Fund (IMF), Canada's real GDP grew by 1.7 per cent in 2025, down from the previous year’s two per cent growth. This was the slowest growth rate since the pandemic, reflecting the impact of increased trade uncertainty (see Figure 2).

U.S. trade policy was a fundamental factor influencing economic performance. Exports were strong early in the year as U.S. buyers accelerated purchases before expected tariffs. However, momentum slowed after the U.S. imposed tariffs on

Canadian goods in March 2025. According to the Bank of Canada, the average effective tariff on Canadian exports increased from near zero to about 5.9 per cent in October, leading to a slowdown that affected trade-exposed industries most.

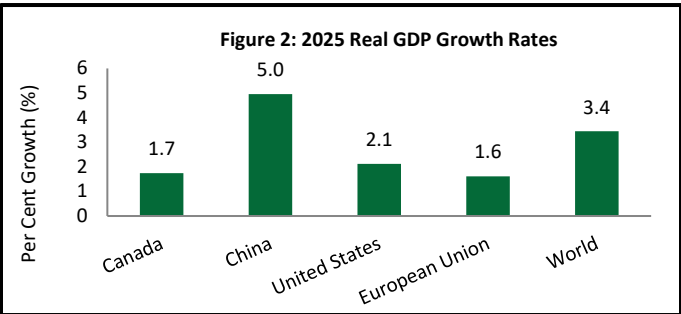
Domestic demand, especially household consumption, helped the economy remain resilient throughout the year (see Figure 1).

Global Economic Growth

Global economic growth remained resilient in 2025, with output expanding by 3.4 per cent, matching the previous year. Although new tariff measures and ongoing geopolitical tensions created uncertainty, their impact on global activity was less severe than expected. Economic stability was supported by moderating inflation, lower borrowing costs, increased investment in artificial intelligence, and a temporary acceleration in trade before tariffs took effect (see Figures 2 and 3).

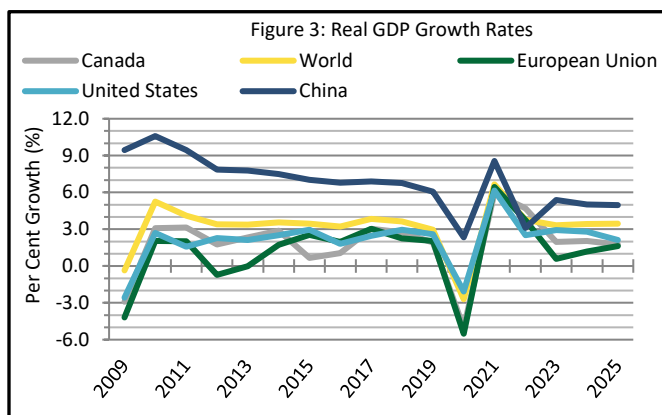
Economic performance varied across major economies. The U.S.’s, SK’s largest trading partner, grew by 2.1 per cent in 2025, down from 2.8 per cent

in 2024. This slowdown was due to tariff measures that raised input costs and reduced production.

According to the IMF, growth in the European Union rose modestly to 1.6 per cent from 1.2 per cent in 2024, supported by higher fiscal spending in Germany and a recovery in investment. However, subdued household consumption continued to limit broader economic momentum.

China's economy maintained steady growth of five per cent in 2025. In response to U.S. tariffs, China redirected exports to Asian and European markets, supported by exchange rate adjustments and ongoing fiscal measures. These actions helped offset continued weakness in the property sector.

Emerging market economies benefited from improved global financial conditions, lower interest rates, and a weaker U.S. dollar. These factors eased external financing pressures and supported economic activity.

Oil & Natural Gas

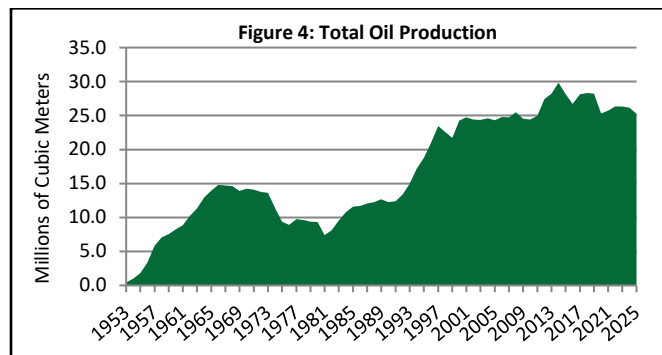
In 2025, SK was the second-largest crude oil producer in Canada, accounting for 9.1 per cent of national output. Total production declined by 3.4 per cent to 25.2 million cubic meters (158.3 million barrels), compared to 26.1 million cubic meters (164.4 million barrels) in 2024. Output decreased across all crude oil types; however, heavy oil, which comprised 51.6 per cent of total production, remained relatively stable.

A total of 1,119 oil and gas wells were drilled in 2025, down 12.6 per cent from 2024.

Crude oil remained SK's largest export commodity by value in 2025. Export revenues declined 9.6 per cent to \$11.3 billion from \$12.5 billion in 2024, reflecting lower production and weaker oil prices. All crude oil exports continued to be destined for the U.S.

SK ranked third among provinces in natural gas production in 2025, producing 3.5 billion cubic meters, a decrease of five per cent from 2024.

Despite lower production, natural gas sales increased 12.8 per cent to \$217 million as higher prices more than offset lower volumes.

Potash

SK's potash sector performed strongly in 2025, with total sales rising to \$9.3 billion, up 18.2 per cent from \$7.8 billion in 2024. This growth was primarily driven by higher prices, as production remained steady at 15.1 million tonnes.

The average price of potash (K_2O) rose from \$517 (US\$377) per tonne in 2024 to \$609 (US\$436) per tonne in 2025. This rebound followed sharp price declines in 2023 and 2024 after record highs in 2022, when global supply disruptions from the Russia-Ukraine conflict and sanctions on Belarusian exports pushed prices to about \$1,335 (US\$1,026) per tonne. The rebound in prices in 2025 reflected stronger demand, especially from major agricultural markets.

The U.S. remained SK's largest export market in 2025, accounting for 46 per cent of total export value, followed by Brazil (18 per cent), Indonesia (7.4 per cent), China (4.9 per cent), and Belgium (3.8 per cent). These top five export markets account for over 80 per cent of SK's potash exports.

Uranium

SK's uranium sales increased 24 per cent to \$3.2 billion in 2025, up from \$2.6 billion in 2024. The increase in the value of sales was driven by higher uranium prices and record-high sales volumes, despite production declining 6.4 per cent to 15,610 tonnes in the year. The average realized price rose to approximately \$182 per tonne in 2025, the highest level recorded and up 11.7 per cent compared to the 2024 average. Prices strengthened in 2025 amid renewed global investment in nuclear energy, including reactor restarts and new construction, growing electricity demand associated with data centres and artificial intelligence, and continued supply constraints stemming from structural market deficits and heightened geopolitical uncertainty.

The increase in sales in 2025 follows a decade of significant volatility in SK's uranium industry. Annual production peaked at 15,500 to 16,560 tonnes from 2015 to 2017 before declining from 2018 to 2022 while the McArthur River mine was placed into care and maintenance. Production reached a low of 4,500 tonnes in 2020 as pandemic-related shutdowns further disrupted operations, including the suspension of production at the Cigar Lake mine. Rising global demand for carbon-free power has strengthened uranium market conditions, driving production to a record 16,672 tonnes in 2024. In 2025, production declined to 15,610 tonnes due to development delays at the McArthur River mine during its transition to new mining areas. Despite lower output, higher uranium prices offset the decrease.

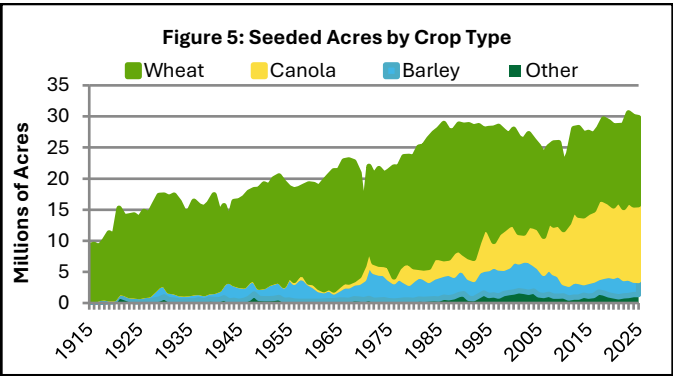
Agriculture

SK's agriculture sector grew by 15.2 per cent in 2025, following 7.7 per cent growth in 2024. Crop production grew by 16.3 per cent to \$7.2 billion. Strong growing conditions supported higher yields, with wheat averaging 49.7 bushels per acre (up 10.9 per cent), canola 44.4 bushels per acre (up 15.9 per cent), and barley 78.2 bushels per acre (up 20.5 per cent).

Despite the strong harvest, crop receipts declined by 4.8 per cent, to 14.8 billion in 2025 from 15.6 billion in 2024, mainly due to lower marketings for canola, lentils and dry peas. In contrast, total livestock receipts in SK increased by 24 per cent, rising from \$4 billion in 2024 to \$5 billion in 2025, driven by higher livestock prices.

Net cash income fell to \$5.2 billion in 2025 from \$6.1 billion a year earlier due to the decline in farm cash receipts and increased operating expenses. Despite the year-over-year decline, SK's net cash income was 6.5 per cent above the five-year average. Over the past decade, cash receipts rose by about 45 per cent to \$21.1 billion, while operating expenses increased by 61 per cent from \$9.9 billion to \$15.9 billion.

Agricultural and food exports, which accounted for more than one-third of SK's international exports, declined by \$0.6 billion to \$18.0 billion in 2025, making it the fourth-largest export year on record. Trade friction with China contributed to a 39 per cent decline in grain and oilseed exports to \$1.9 billion. China remained SK's largest export market for cereal grains and oilseeds combined. At the same time, shipments to Japan increased by 32.1 per cent to \$1.2 billion, while exports to the U.S. declined by 8.0 per cent to \$1.0 billion.

Labour & Income

SK's labour market strengthened further in 2025, building on gains from 2024. Total employment reached a record 617,400, up 15,200 from 2024. The unemployment rate fell from 5.4 per cent to 5.2 per cent, the lowest among provinces.

The labour force grew to 651,200 in 2025, with the participation rate steady at 67.4 per cent, reflecting continued workforce engagement. Average weekly earnings rose by 4.1 per cent, from \$1,217 in 2024 to \$1,267 in 2025, supported by labour market competition, resource sector wage premiums, public sector agreements, and inflation-related adjustments.

Mining, quarrying and oil and gas extraction remained SK's highest-paying industry, with average weekly earnings rising to \$2,450, up from \$2,308 in 2024, a 6.1 per cent increase. Construction earnings increased from \$1,461 to \$1,527, while health care and social assistance earnings rose from \$1,087 to \$1,143. Wage growth across both goods-producing and service-producing industries suggests that labour demand remained strong relative to labour supply.

Investment

Capital investment in SK reached \$19.7 billion in 2025, an increase of 13.8 per cent from 2024 and 15.6 per cent from 2023, sustaining the province's investment growth. Mining, quarrying, and oil and gas extraction remained the largest category, rising 21 per cent to \$8.1 billion, supported by ongoing potash mine expansions. Utilities, transportation and warehousing, and public administration also saw investment gains, reflecting continued strength across industries. Conversely, agriculture declined 6.5 per cent to \$1.7 billion, marking its second consecutive annual decrease due to elevated input costs and weaker farm margins.

Residential construction increased significantly in 2025, with housing starts up 42.4 per cent to 6,150 units, the highest since 2014 and more than double the 2019 low. This rebound resulted from a delayed supply response to strong population growth in 2023 and 2024, driven by international migration.

Non-residential building construction rose 14.2 per cent to \$2.2 billion in 2025, driven by a 49.8 per cent increase in institutional and governmental construction to \$831 million. Commercial construction increased 1.1 per cent to \$972 million,

while industrial construction fell 5 per cent to \$355 million.

Retail Trade

SK's retail sales reached \$26.3 billion in 2025, up 2.5 per cent from 2024. While growth moderated compared to recent years, retail activity remained broadly based, with eight of nine retail subsectors reporting higher sales. Continued population growth supported consumer spending across the province.

Growth was led by building material and equipment dealers, with sales up 16.8 per cent, reflecting strong home construction and renovation activity. Sales also rose among clothing retailers (15.5 per cent) and health and personal care stores (8.7 per cent), supported by sustained household spending and population growth. Motor vehicle and parts dealers remained the largest retail subsector, accounting for 26.2 per cent of total sales, though sales increased by only 0.3 per cent.

Gasoline stations were the only retail subsector to record lower sales, declining by 4.5 per cent. This decrease was driven by lower pump prices rather than weaker demand. The federal consumer carbon tax, about 17.6 cents per litre on gasoline, was removed on April 1, 2025, reducing retail fuel prices by up to 18 cents per litre and lowering the dollar value of gasoline station sales.

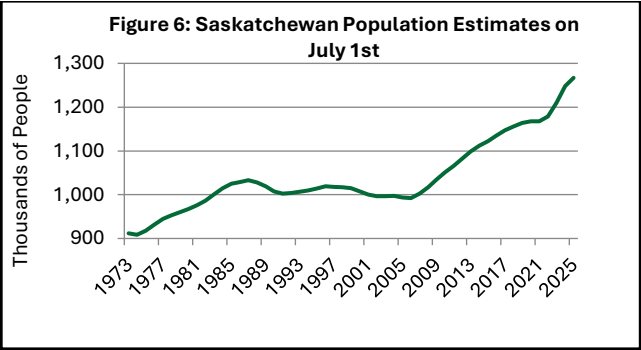
Population

As of July 1, 2025, SK's population reached a record 1,266,959, an increase of 19,091 residents (1.5 per cent) over the previous year. Growth was still driven by international migration, which added 19,622 residents, but the pace slowed significantly. Net international migration was 36,127 in 2023 and 38,604 in 2024, so the 2025 inflow was about half that of prior years. Natural increase contributed to 1,975 (13,147 births compared to 11,172 deaths), while net interprovincial outflow continued, narrowing to 2,506.

This slowdown reflects the federal government's 2025 to 2027 Immigration Levels Plan, announced in October 2024, which reduced planned permanent-

resident admissions from 500,000 to 395,000 for 2025 and, for the first time, set lower targets for temporary residents, including international students and foreign workers.

These developments conclude a decade of strong expansion, with the population increasing by 11.6 per cent since 2015 but mark a clear turning point as growth slows from the migration-driven highs of 2022 to 2024.

Vehicles

In 2025, SK had 1,253,125 registered vehicles, an increase of 37,874 (3.1 per cent) from 2024. Most of the increase was in light trucks, whose registrations rose by 4.7 per cent, while car registrations declined by 3.9 per cent. This trend continues a long-term shift in the fleet's composition: light and heavy trucks now account for 62.3 per cent of registrations, while the car share has fallen below 16 per cent. This pattern reflects ongoing consumer preference for sport-utility vehicles and pickups.

New motor vehicle sales rose about nine per cent in 2025 to approximately 55,346 units valued at \$3.3 billion. Truck sales increased by 9.6 per cent, reinforcing the truck-dominated provincial fleet. This growth reflects the recovery of vehicle supply after pandemic-related constraints and continued population growth.

The fleet's fuel composition continued to evolve. Gasoline vehicle registrations increased by 7.7 per cent to 749,131, while diesel registrations rose by 7.2 per cent. Hybrid and battery-electric vehicle registrations grew by 69.4 per cent and 61.7 per cent respectively, though together they still made up only

about 2 per cent (19,600) of the fleet (998,268). Growth continued despite the suspension of the federal Incentives for Zero-Emission Vehicles (iZEV) program in January 2025, reflecting greater model availability and increased manufacturer supply.

Utilities

In 2025, SK's electricity consumption reached 26,769 GWh, a 2.1 per cent increase over the previous year. Growth was driven by cleaner sources: wind increased by 27.7 per cent, hydro by 12.6 per cent, solar by 8.4 per cent, and gas by 3.0 per cent. Coal generation declined by 9.3 per cent. Natural gas, coal, and hydro supplied 81.5 per cent of total generation, while wind and solar contributed a combined 10.9 per cent.

Demand growth was uneven: residential and farm consumption rose by 5.4 and 6.6 per cent, respectively, while industrial demand remained stable and oil-field demand declined. Electricity exports saw the largest increase, rising 90.1 per cent to 916 GWh, driven by higher surplus sales to neighbouring markets.

This growth extends a decade-long transformation of SK's electricity system. Since 2016, consumption has risen by 11 per cent, driven by industrial and resource-sector demand. Coal's share of supply dropped from 45 per cent to 24 per cent, while natural gas increased to 48 per cent and wind generation more than tripled.

Provincial water consumption was approximately 577 million cubic metres, a five per cent decrease from 2024 but 31 per cent above 2016 level. Over the past decade, rising water use has been driven mainly by irrigation and growing resource-sector demand. In contrast municipal water consumption has remained stable.

Conclusion

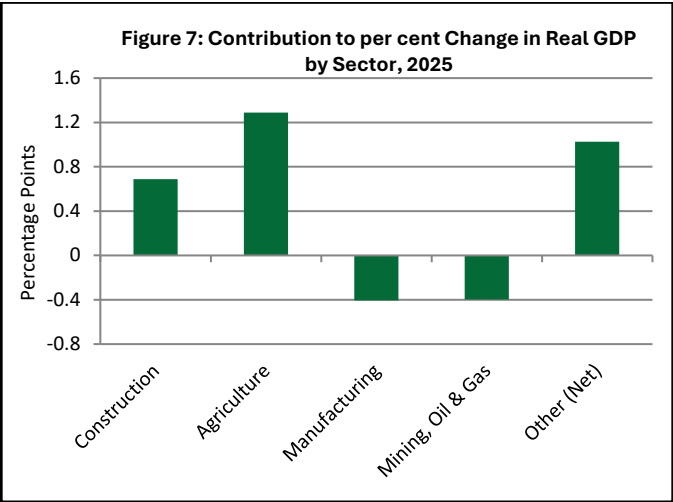
SK's economy demonstrated notable resilience in 2025, posting its fourth consecutive year of growth despite a challenging external trade environment. Real GDP rose 2.2 per cent to \$85.4 billion, driven by strong performances in agriculture and construction,

alongside continued strength in the labour market, population growth, and capital investment.

As of July 1, 2025, SK’s population reached 1,266,959, reflecting an annual increase of 19,091 individuals. This growth was primarily driven by international migration.

The province’s resource sectors delivered mixed but largely positive results. Potash and uranium sales both posted gains, while oil and gas production softened amid lower prices.

SK’s labour market continued to strengthen in 2025, with the addition of 15,200 jobs. The province’s unemployment rate stood at 5.2 per cent, the lowest among all provinces.

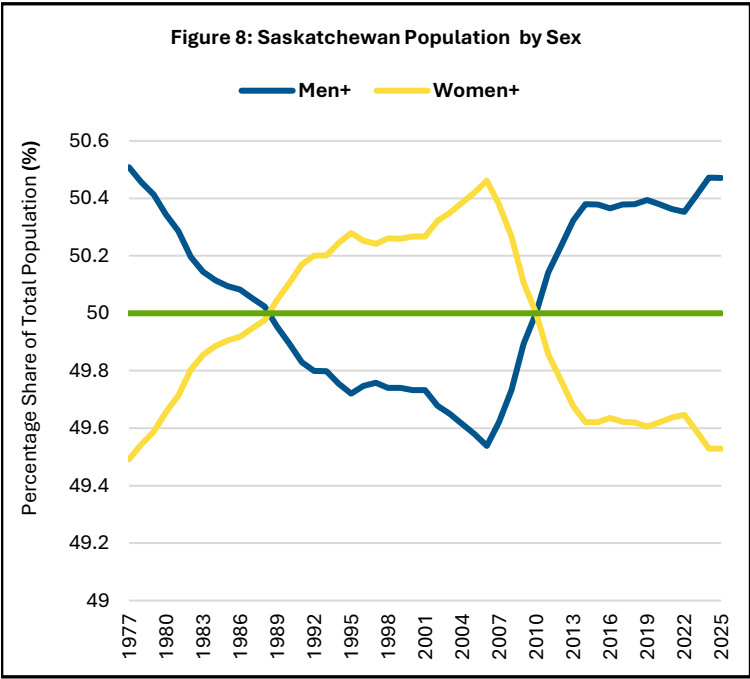

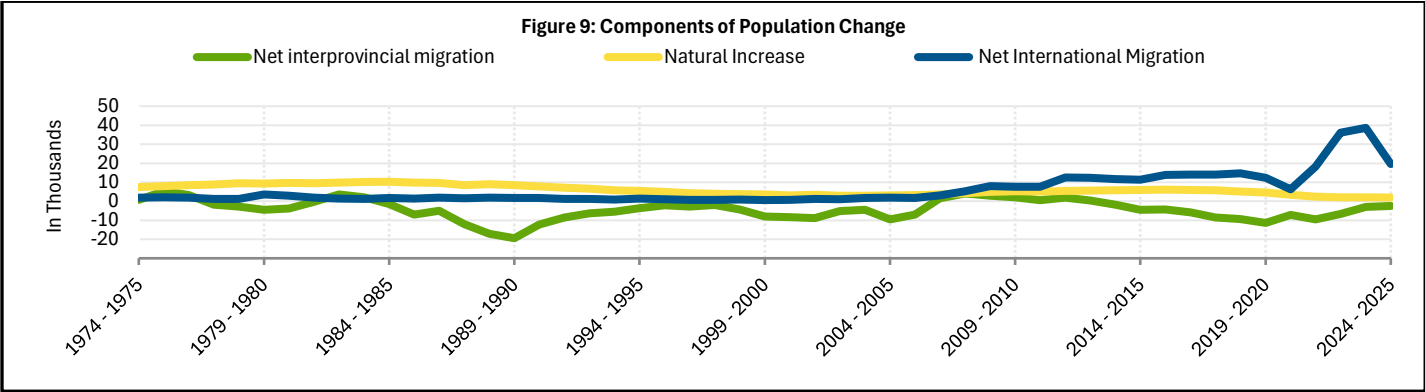

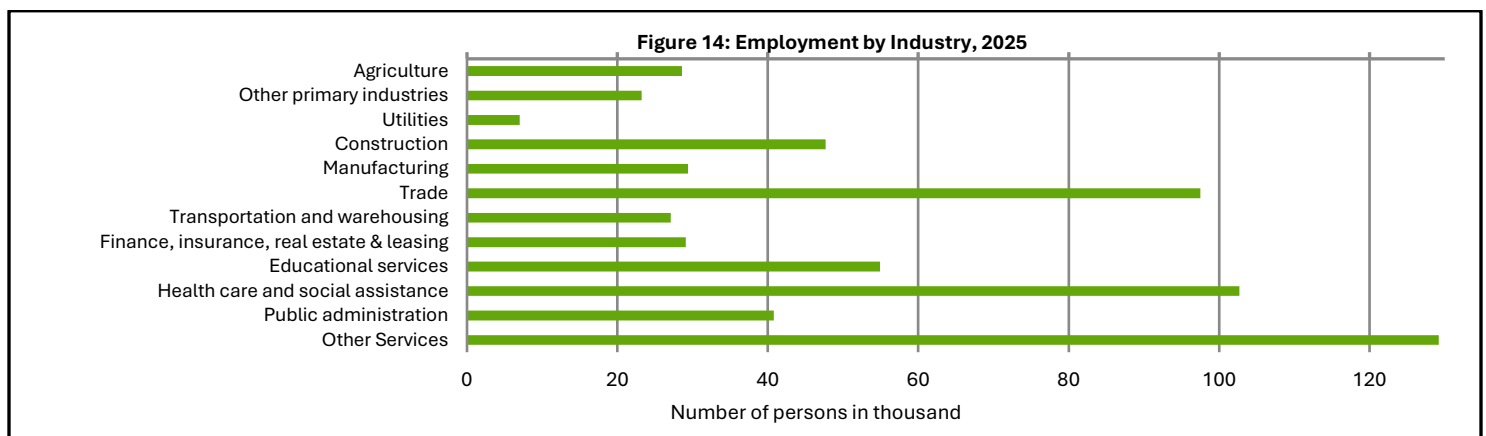

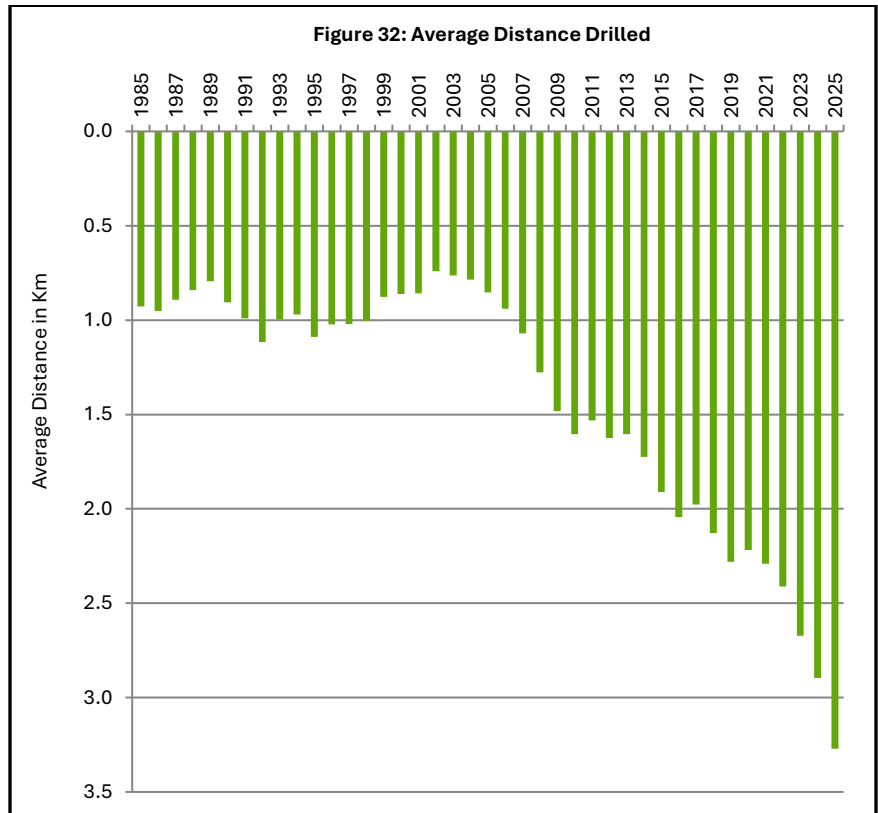

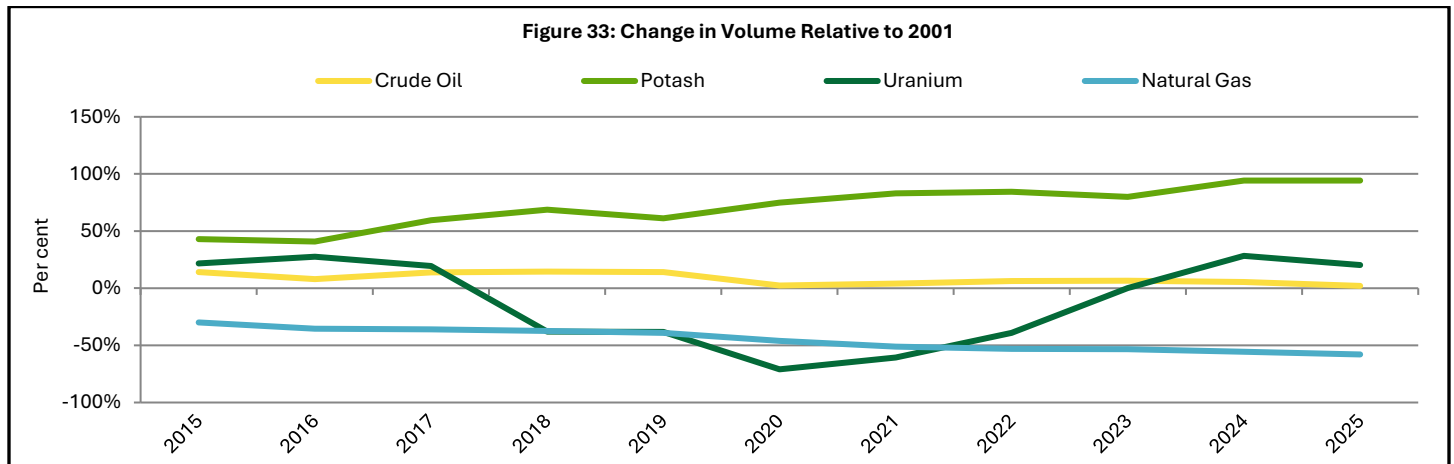

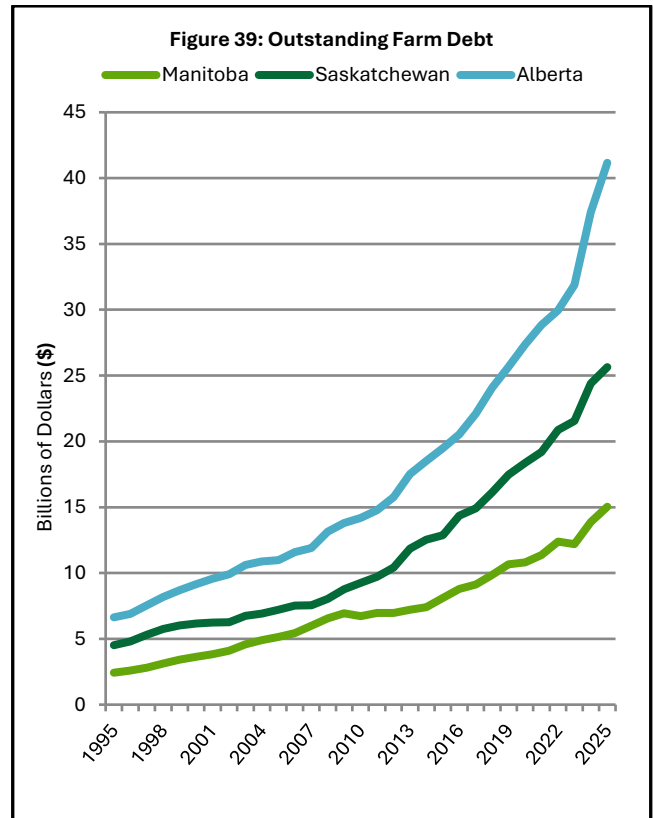

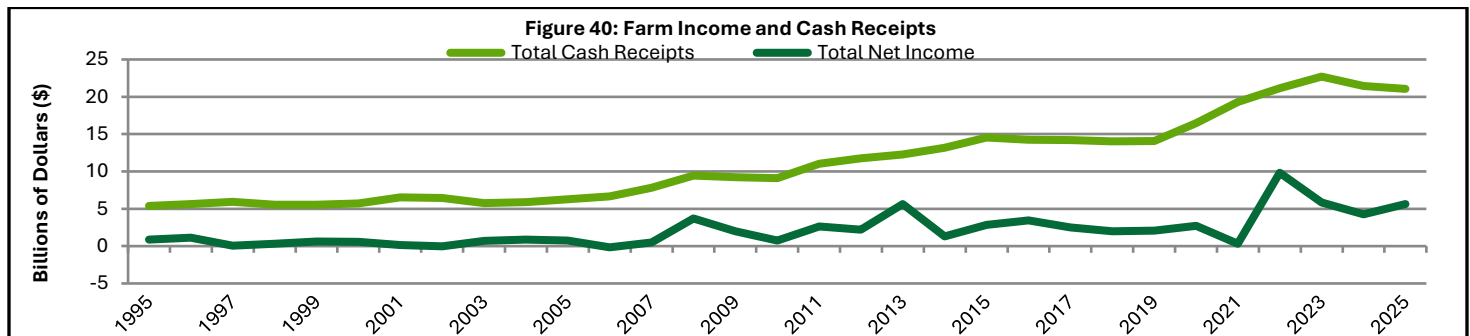

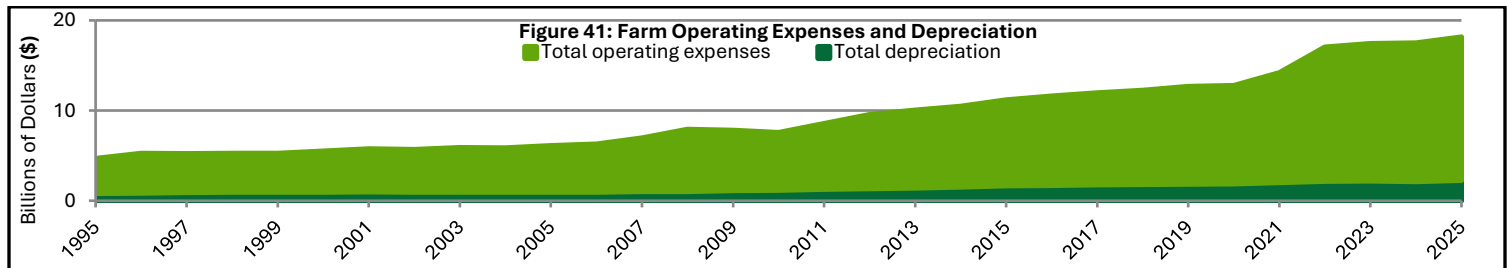

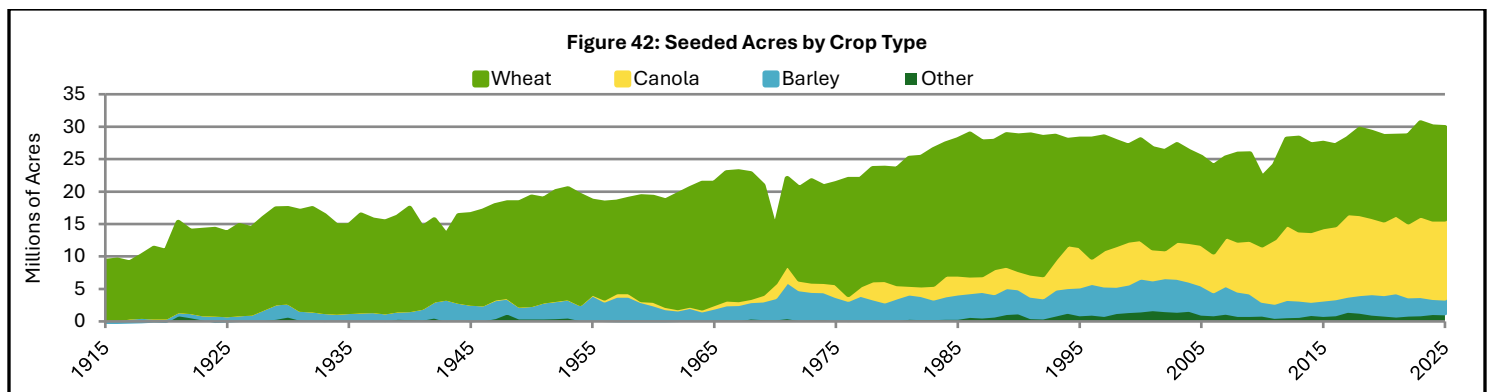

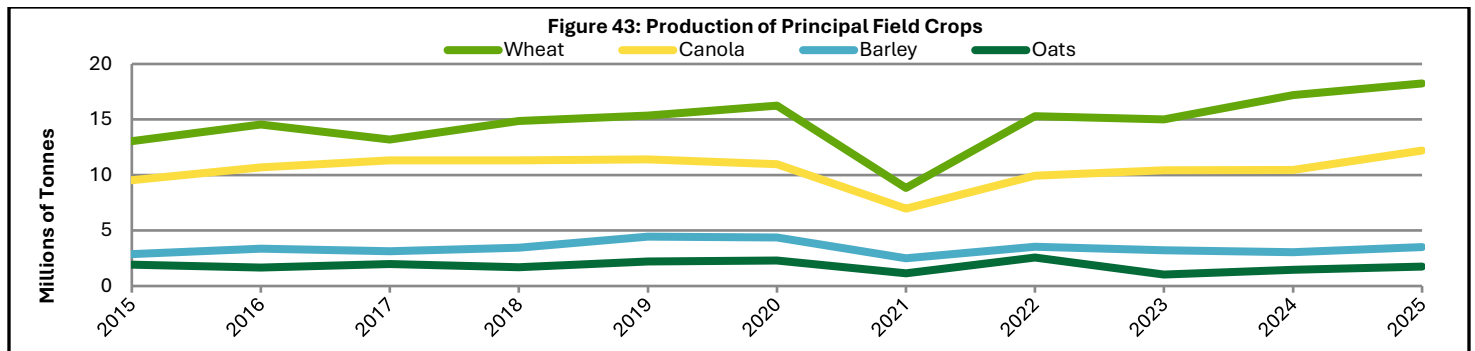

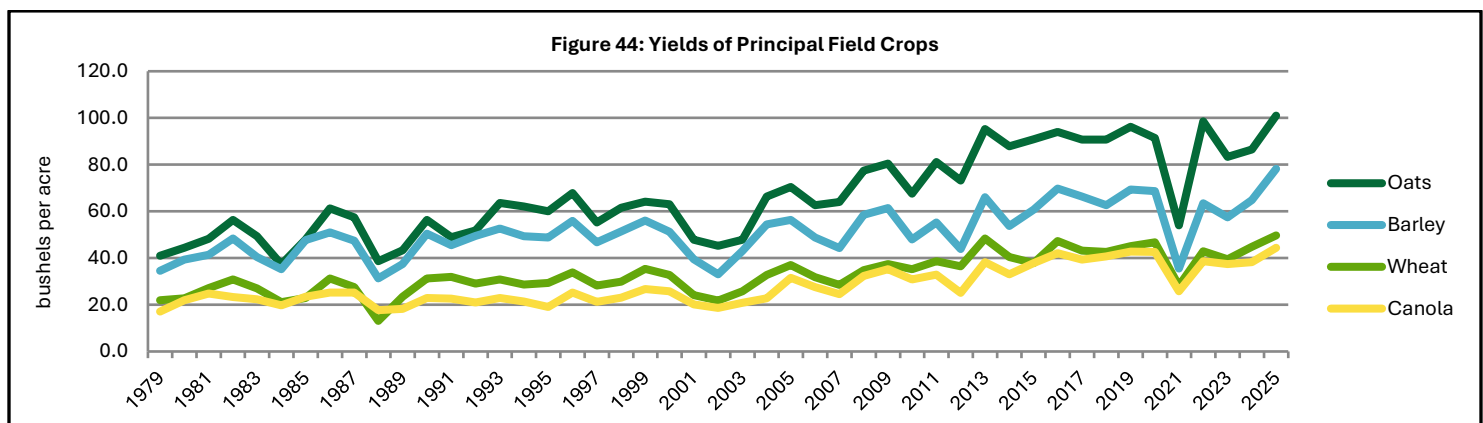

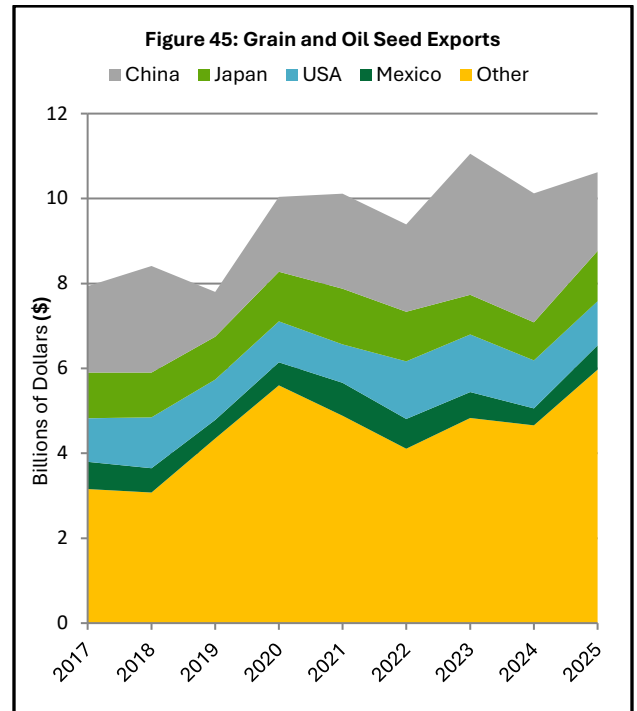

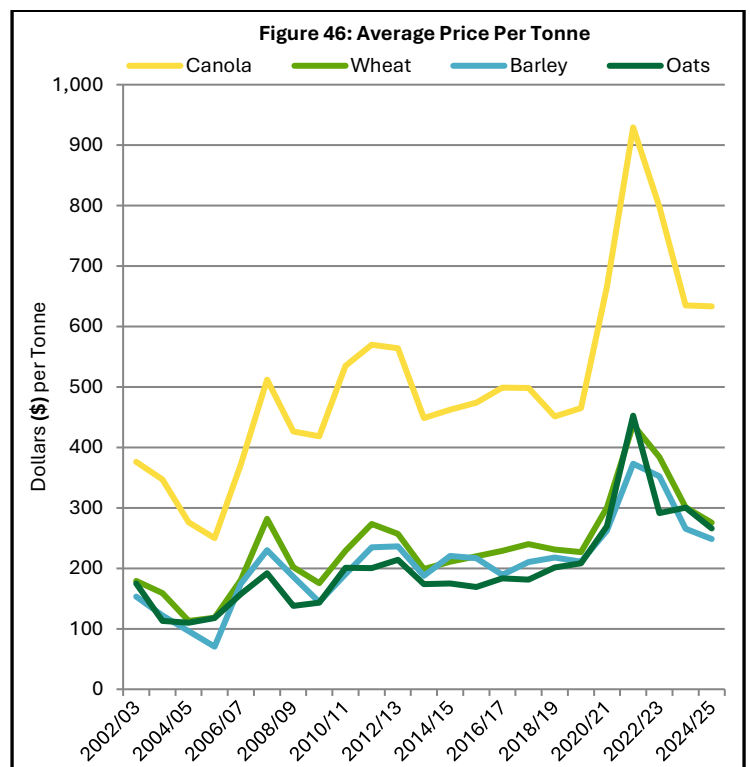

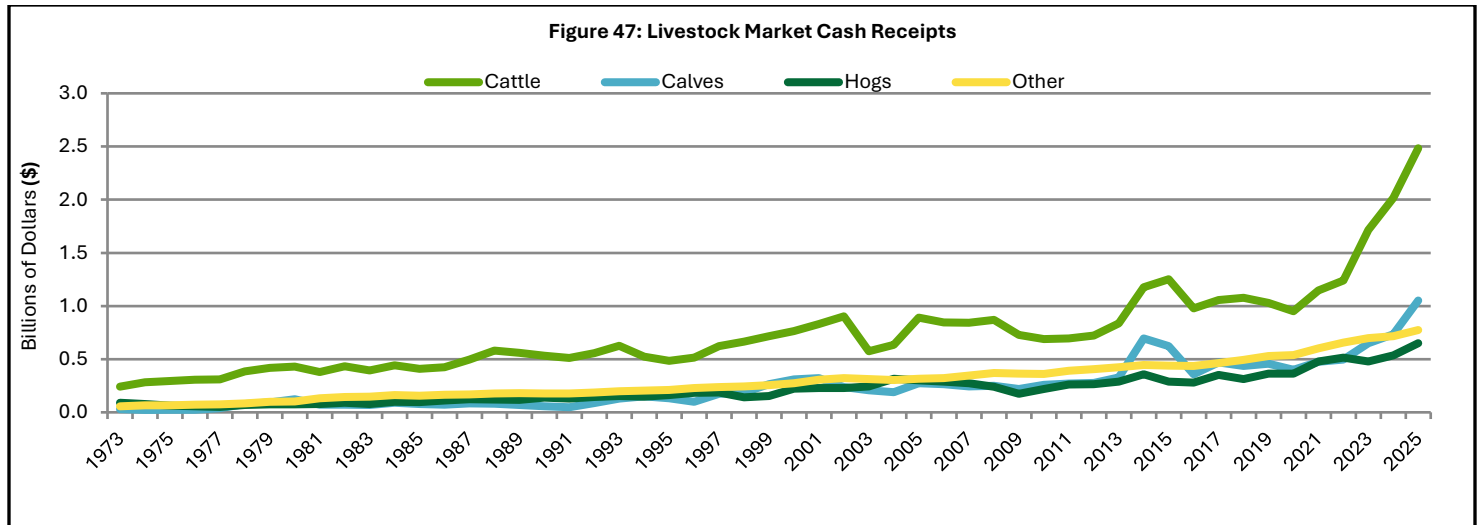

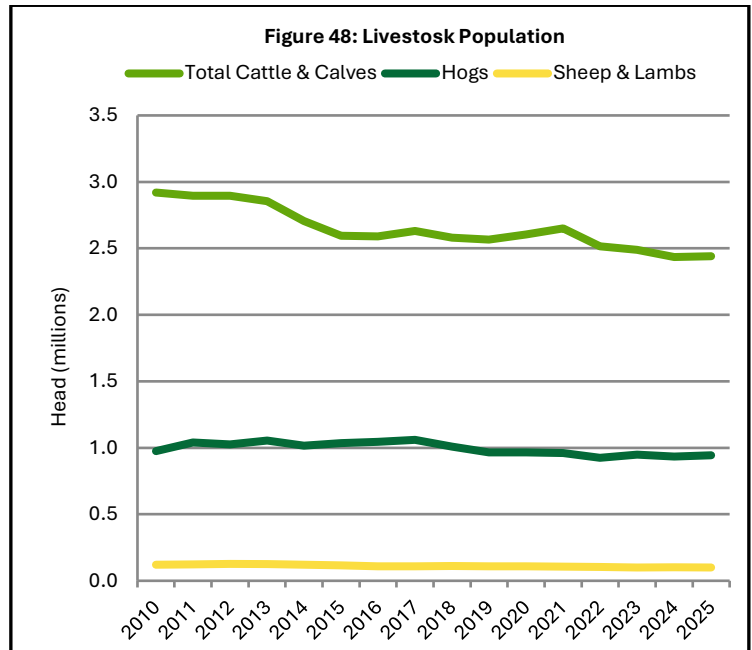

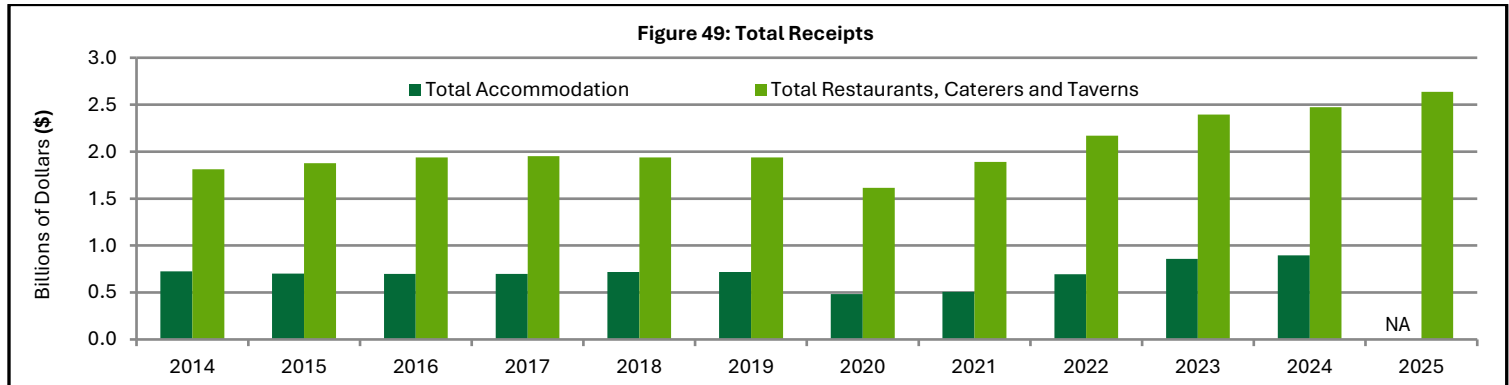

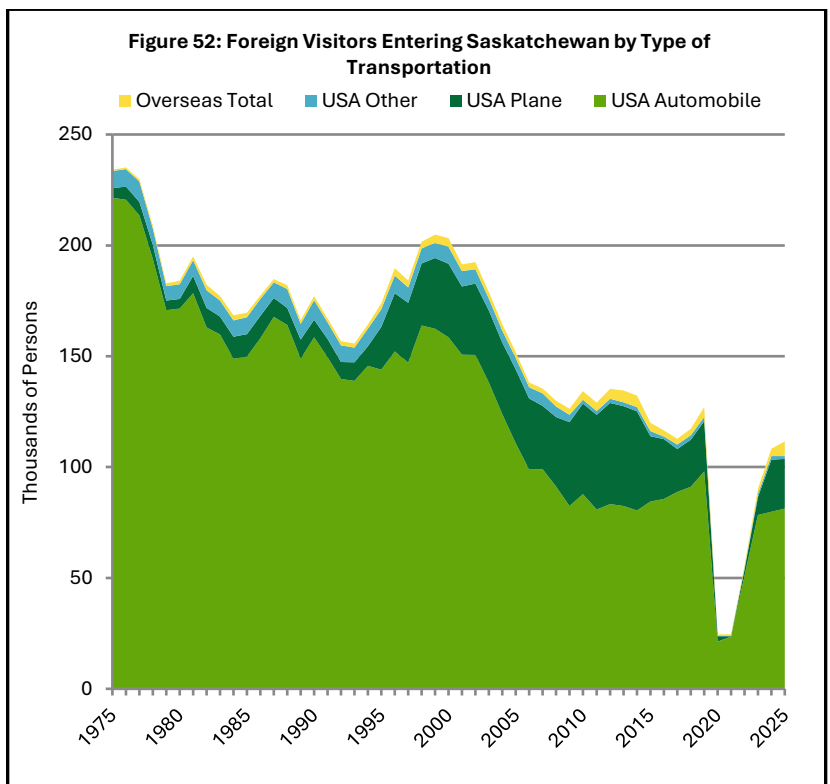

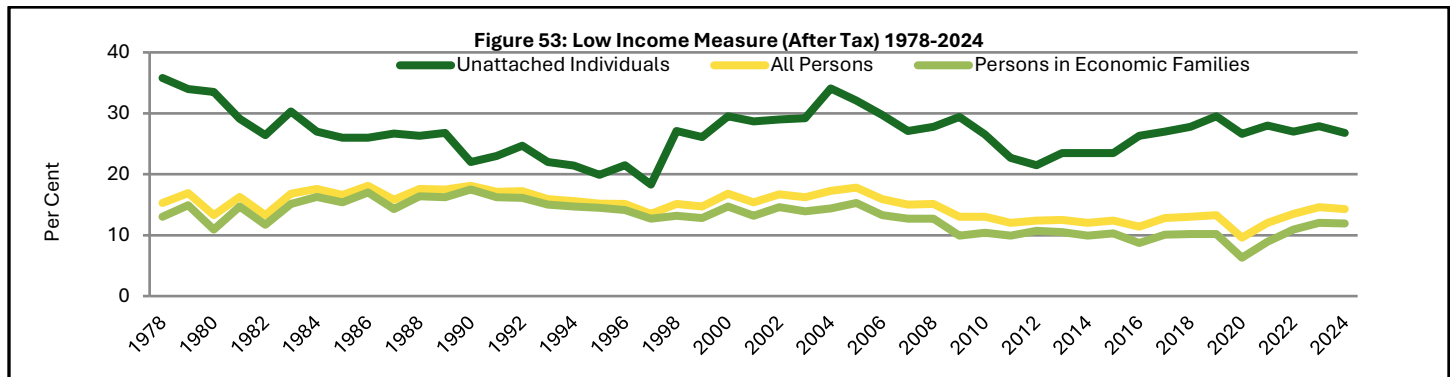
