Introduction

In 2020, the public health measures to reduce the spread of COVID-19 significantly affected the movement of goods and people, resulting in a negative impact on the economy. The Saskatchewan real Gross Domestic Product (GDP) by industry at basic prices declined by 5.2 per cent from 2019 to 2020.

Overall, more than half of the 20 industrial sectors saw a downturn. However, some of these sectors showed resilience: finance and insurance increased by 4.8 per cent, information and communication technology rose by 2.4 per cent, and agriculture increased by 1.8 per cent. The largest decline was recorded in the service-producing industries; the arts, entertainment and recreation, and accommodation and food services sectors had the sharpest decline of 34.3 per cent and 25.4 per cent.


Despite economic challenges, among all provinces Saskatchewan recorded the largest growth increase in total export sales over the previous year. The largest growth was recorded in farm, fishing, and intermediate food products, which increased by 31.0 per cent.

Internationally, the Fraser Institute ranked Saskatchewan as the third most attractive jurisdiction in the world for mining investment in 2020.

Canadian Economic Growth

According to Statistics Canada, the national real GDP at market price shrank by 5.3 per cent in 2020, with strong variations between the quarters.

The strongest contraction was recorded in the second quarter (-11.3%) due to lockdowns and health measures. In the third quarter, the GDP rose by 9.1 per cent, reflecting the reopening of the economy; while the fourth quarter recorded an increase of 2.2 per cent.



Global Economic Growth

In 2020, economies all around the globe were impacted by COVID-19 public health measures, restrictions, and business closures, which resulted in the worst contraction in decades.


According to the International Monetary Fund (IMF), the global economy fell by 3.3 per cent in 2020 after growing by 2.8 per cent in 2019. This is the first time the economy has contracted since 2009.

All major advanced economies (G7) recorded a GDP contraction in 2020. For example, the United States, Saskatchewan's largest trading partner, saw its economy shrink by 3.5 per cent.


The European Union mirrored the downtrend in GDP with a contraction of 6.1 per cent, but China's economy grew by 2.3 per cent in 2020. China's growth rate is comparatively high, but still lower than its 10-year average of 6.8 per cent.




Oil & Natural Gas

In 2020, the total value of Saskatchewan's natural gas sales rose significantly by 28.6 per cent, making it the largest growth since 2014. Comparatively, the total value of oil sales decreased from \$10.3 billion in 2019 to \$5.5 billion in 2020. During this same period, Saskatchewan remained the third-largest natural gas producing province in Canada, with an annual production of 4.5 billion cubic meters, which is a decrease of 580 million cubic meters from 2019.

2020 annual oil production was 25.3 million cubic meters (159.1 million barrels), which is a decrease of 3.0 million cubic meters (18.6 million barrels) from the previous year.



On a cumulative basis, Saskatchewan's lifetime oil production reached 1.09 billion cubic meters in 2020.



A total of 1,058 new oil and gas wells were drilled in 2020, this is 822 wells down from the 1,880 drilled in 2019. Horizontal wells became the predominant way of drilling oil wells in Saskatchewan and started outnumbering vertical wells for the first time in 2009. In 2020, 85.7 per cent of drilled wells were horizontal and the average meters drilled per well was 2,218, compared to 2,280 meters in 2019.

Potash

In 2020, potash production rose by 8.4 per cent from 12.6 million tonnes in 2019 to 13.6 million tonnes. In the same period, the average price of a tonne of potash (K2O) was \$401.4/tonne, decreasing by 19.8 per cent from \$500.6/tonne in 2019. As a result, the total value of potash sales declined from \$6.3 billion in 2019 to \$5.5 billion in 2020. Potash remained Saskatchewan's second-largest mineral export.


The United States, Brazil, China, and India accounted for 83.2 per cent of Saskatchewan's potash exports.

Agriculture

According to Statistics Canada, Saskatchewan's total crop production rose by 1.7 per cent to 39.8 million tonnes in 2020. In the same period, Saskatchewan farmers produced more wheat (+4.1%), dry peas (+7.1%), lentils (+13.0%), and flaxseed (+26.1%), which is the result of better harvest conditions compared to 2019.

While canola and barley decreased their production by 3.7 per cent and 1.4 per cent, respectively. In 2020, there were significant increases in the seeded areas of beans by 60.5 per cent, lentils by 12.4 per cent, and rye by 22.9 per cent; while mustard seed and chickpeas decreased by 41.0 per cent and 24.0 per cent, respectively. Summerfallow continued to decline below the one-million-acre mark compared to 8.3 million 10 years ago.

In 2020, wheat yields across the province averaged 3,088 kg/hectare, increasing by 1.8 per cent from 2019 at 3,032 kg/hectare. Canola yields remained mostly unchanged compared to last year while flaxseed yields averaged 1,469 kg/hectare in 2020, up by 8.5 per cent from 1,354 kg/hectare in 2019.

According to Statistics Canada, Saskatchewan's grain and oil seed exports rose substantially by 28.7 per cent in 2020 after a decline of 7.2 per cent the previous year. The growth was led by greater exports to China (+67.7%), Italy (+86.6%), Belgium (+74.1%), Mexico (+23.8%) and Japan (+16.2%), which accounted for more than 45.0 per cent of total exports.

Total cash income was \$16.6 billion and operating costs reached a record high of \$10.2 billion, resulting in a net income of \$6.4 billion. After factoring in non-cash transactions in 2020, total net farm income was \$2.9 billion, which is \$0.7 billion more than in 2019.

Employment & Income

Saskatchewan's employment contracted for the first time since 2017. After growing by 1.9 per cent in 2019, employment declined by 4.7 per cent in 2020 to an average of 544,100 people. Saskatchewan's unemployment rate declined from 2016 to 2019 before it increased 2.8 percentage points to 8.4 per cent in 2020; the second-lowest rate among provinces and below the national rate of 9.5 per cent. The labour force decreased by 10,600 to 593,900 people in the same period.

Average weekly earnings in Saskatchewan went up 4.9 per cent in 2020 to \$1,092 per week, slightly under Canada's average weekly earnings of \$1,097.

The mining, oil, and gas sector continued to offer the province's highest average wages at \$1,917 per week.


Investment

New capital investment in 2020 was \$12.4 billion, down \$2.4 billion from 2019. Most of the decline was in the mining, quarrying, and the oil and gas extraction sector which declined by \$1.7 billion. This sector still represented Saskatchewan's highest share of capital spending at 36.3 per cent in 2020, and fell by 26.9 per cent in 2020 (-\$1.7 billion to \$4.5 billion) after a 13.1 per cent increase in 2019 (+\$0.7 billion to \$6.2 billion).

Between 2019 and 2020, housing starts rose by 26.8 per cent, which is the highest growth on record since 2012. During the same period, the value of building permits was down 12.3 per cent and investment in non-residential building construction fell by 21.5 per cent. The investment in the institutional and governmental component represented the highest decrease of 38.4 per cent, followed by decreases in industrial and commercial components by 27.3 per cent and 16.8 per cent, respectively.

Population

As of July 1, 2020, the Saskatchewan population increased by 6,821 persons. Between July 1, 2019 and June 30, 2020 there were 14,457 births and 9,744 deaths in the province, resulting in a natural increase of 4,713, down by 8.9 per cent from 5,176 in 2019.

Additionally, in the same period, interprovincial migration accounted for 13,793 persons moving into Saskatchewan from other provinces and territories, while 25,205 persons moved away, representing a net loss of 11,412 persons. The net international migration recorded 13,520 persons. Combined, the natural increase and net migration resulted in a total population increase of 6,821 persons over the year.

Retail Trade

Saskatchewan retailers finished 2020 with \$19.3 billion in sales, down 1.3 per cent from 2019. On a per capita basis, retail trade declined between 2019 and 2020 by \$307 per person to 16,352. Sales were down in 6 out of 11 subsectors, the largest decline in the core retail sales (this excludes sales by gasoline stations and motor vehicle and parts dealers) was recorded in clothing and clothing accessory stores sales (22.1%).

Although, retail sales fell by 1.3 per cent in 2020, the core retail sales recorded a growth of 4.5 per cent in the same period, the highest growth on record since 2014. The building material and garden equipment and supplies dealers subsector contributed the most (12.1%) to the sales increase in the core retail subsectors, followed respectively by food and beverage stores (9.0%) and health and personal care stores (6.3%).

Vehicles

After two consecutive years of decline, the number of registered vehicles in Saskatchewan went up by 1,565 from 2019 to 1,154,464. The increase was driven by growth in the light (1.4%) and heavy trucks (0.8%) categories, which accounts for almost 60% of total registrations. Meanwhile, the cars segment decreased by 3.9 per cent, the largest yearly decline ever recorded.

In 2020, electric vehicle registrations increased by 75.9 per cent and have seen a steady increase since 2010. Conversely, registrations for diesel-powered vehicles decreased by 0.5 per cent and continued to decline since 2017, while gasoline-powered vehicles registered a slight increase of 0.1 per cent.

Utilities

Consumption of Saskatchewan's electrical energy decreased from 25,339 GWh in 2019 to 24,536 GWh in 2020. The largest declines were observed respectively in commercial (-4.6%), industrial (-3.9%), and oil field (-6.3%) operations, while residential demand recorded an increase of 2.7 per cent above the 10-year average of 1.0 per cent.


In 2020, Saskatchewan's wind generation continued its trend of strong growth for the second year in a row. The wind power generation came to 900 GWh in 2020, which is a 14.6 per cent increase or 115 GWh more than in 2019. However, gas, coal, and hydro power generation accounted for 93.8 per cent of the total electricity production in Saskatchewan, while wind and other sources of generation accounted for 3.7 per cent and 2.6 per cent.

Conclusion

In 2020, all provinces were impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, including Saskatchewan. Saskatchewan real GDP at basic prices contracted by 5.2 per cent, the seventh largest decline among the provinces. In the same period, Saskatchewan's economy was affected by a decline in both goods-producing (-6.7%) and service-producing (-4.1%) industries.

The largest decline in goods-producing industries was recorded in the construction sector (-10.9%), followed by the mining, quarrying, and oil and gas extraction sector (-9.2%), and the manufacturing sector (-8.1%).

The service-producing industries were more heavily affected by the changes in the economy. The arts, entertainment and recreation, and accommodation and food services sectors had the sharpest decline of 34.3 per cent and 25.4 per cent, respectively.

Other sectors of the economy, however, showed resilience. Financial services and agriculture sectors increased by 4.8 per cent and 1.8 per cent. Over the last two decades the agriculture industry recorded strong results in terms of total crop production, which doubled to a record of almost 40 million tonnes in 2020.

Despite the damages inflicted by the COVID-19 pandemic to the province, Saskatchewan's per capita investment was the second highest among provinces in 2020 and well above the Canadian average. The average weekly earnings in Saskatchewan went up 4.9 per cent in 2020, which is the highest increase ever recorded since 2012.

Moreover, Saskatchewan's unemployment rate remained below the national average and was the second-lowest among all provinces.

- Due to rounding, some totals may not correspond with the sum of the separate figures.
- Statistics Canada undertakes regular revisions to the quarterly and annual GDP estimates at the time of new releases to incorporate new and revised data.



Figure 2: Components of Population Change



Figure 11: Population by Age



Figure 12: Population by Economic Region













Figure 18: 2020 Average Weekly Hours



Figure 19: 2020 Average Weekly Earnings



Figure 20: Per Capita Retail Trade



Figure 21: Retail Trade by Kind of Business







Figure 24: Consumer Price Index by Major Component



Figure 25: Value of Building Permits



Figure 27: Total Starts by Region



Figure 28: Non-Residential Investment by Industry





Figure 30: Per Capita Total New Investment Expenditures







Figure 33: Change in Volume Relative to 2001



Figure 34: Mineral Sales by Kind



Figure 35: Value of Potash Exports



Figure 36: Value of Forest Product Exports



Figure 37: Average Size of Farms



Figure 38: Value of Farm Capital











Figure 43: Production of Principal Field Crops



Figure 44: Yields of Principal Field Crops



Figure 45: Grain and Oil Seed Exports



Figure 46: Average Price Per Tonne



Figure 47: Livestock Market Cash Receipts



Figure 48: Livestock Population



Figure 50: Air Traffic Statistics



Figure 51: Saskatchewan Residents Returning from Abroad by Type of Transportation



Figure 52: Foreign Visitors Entering Saskatchewan by Type of Transportation



Figure 53: Low Income Measure (After Tax) 1976-2019



Figure 54: Number of Tax Filers By Income Level, Saskatchewan



Figure 55: Police-Reported Crime Rate and Crime Severity Indexes, Saskatchewan





Figure 59: Greenhouse Gas Emissions by Sector



Figure 60: Water Consumption by Sector


